PACIFIC AVENUE/STATE ROUTE 7 BUS RAPID TRANSIT (BRT)
RUNNING WAY OPTION, STATION LOCATIONS, AND TACOMA DOME STATION
ACCESS FOR THE LOCALLY PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE (LPA)**

A public hearing will be held as part of the Board of Commissioners' meeting on Monday, March 11, 2019. The meeting begins at 4:00 pm and is held in the Pierce Transit Training Center - Rainier Conference Room, 3720 96th Street SW, Lakewood, Washington 98499.

The purpose of the Public Hearing is to allow public comment on:

- The recommended BRT running way option
 - Curbside/Business Access Transit Lanes – Under this alternative, buses would travel in the outside (right) lane of the roadway. Transit riders would access curbside BRT stations from the sidewalk.
 - Hybrid/Median – Under this alternative, buses would travel in the center of the roadway in designated segments. Transit riders would be required to cross half the roadway width to access median BRT stations.
- The 31 proposed BRT station location pairs, plus one at each terminus; and
- BRT access (routing) from Pacific Avenue to Tacoma Dome Station and back before continuing north into downtown Tacoma or south to Spanaway.

The public is invited to appear at the hearing to offer testimony. Written comments should be submitted to Tina Lee, Planning Manager, 3701 96th Street SW, Lakewood, WA 98499, no later than Thursday, March 28, 2019.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING OPTIONAL PERMIT PARKING AT TACOMA DOME STATION

A public hearing will be held as part of the Board of Commissioners' meeting on Monday, March 11, 2019. The meeting begins at 4:00 pm and is held in the Pierce Transit Training Center - Rainier Conference Room, 3720 96th Street SW, Lakewood, Washington 98499.

Pierce Transit is considering optional permit parking at the Tacoma Dome Station (TDS) as this facility fills up very early on weekdays. Regular transit riders often have a difficult time finding a parking space unless they arrive well in advance of their planned transit trip. The proposed program would offer a reserved parking option that would give regular transit riders a reliable place to park and improve transit operations by more evenly spreading out demand for parking spaces throughout the morning rush hour.

The purpose of the Public Hearing is to allow public comment on the proposal. Highlights of the proposed optional permit parking plan include:

- Permits would be optional.
- There would be 200 reserved parking spots (150 single-occupancy and 50 high-occupancy), which totals 8.4 percent of the overall 2,400 spots.
- Those parking *without* a permit could:
 - Use the reserved spots for free after 8 a.m. on weekdays and all day on weekends, or
 - Continue parking in one of the 2,200 non-reserved spots on a first-come, first-served basis as they are today.
- In order to hold a permit, the transit rider must have 12 verified transit trips per month on a bus, vanpool, or Sounder train. For HOV, at least two passengers in the group must meet this threshold.
- Proposed pricing:
 - High Occupancy Vehicle: Free for 2+ riders arriving together; riders must have ORCA card
 - Single Occupancy Vehicle (SOV): \$80/month; must have ORCA card
 - ORCA LIFT SOV: \$27/month with ORCA LIFT card
- Pierce Transit Chief Executive Officer would be authorized to manage demand and waitlists by modifying percentage of reserved stalls and/or adjusting rates as needed.

Dear Commissioner Henderson:

The Dome Business District respectfully advocates for the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners to approve optional permit parking at the Tacoma Dome Station (TDS).

To encourage cleaner and more economical commute options for commuters in the South Sound, the Dome Business District supports the implementation of high occupancy vehicles (HOV) and single occupancy vehicle (SOV) permit parking at the Tacoma Dome Station. The permit program should follow Sound Transit's model already in place as their model has been successfully tested and operationalized. Specifically, we support the notion of allowing up to 200 SOV and HOV parking spaces be reserved for permit parking during weekday morning peak hours.

This is an important first step in better parking management for the transportation hub. We are strong supporters of mass transit and see this as necessary change to manage the growth around transportation in the district.

With Sound Transit's expansion of its permit parking programs to facilities in Pierce Transit's service area (i.e. Puyallup Sounder Station and Lakewood Sounder Station) it is only equitable that the Tacoma Dome Station be included. This would also meet the goal of the Regional Parking Management group of cooperation and integration.

We appreciate the opportunity to show our support for a permit parking program at TDS. Furthermore, we support the implementation of daily parking fees for all parking spots at TDS at some time in the future.

January 14, 2019

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Henderson called the Board meeting to order at 4:06 p.m. Clerk Jacobson announced that there currently is not a quorum, but we are expecting a quorum of the Board as members join in the meeting.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

For those attendees who chose to participate, Chair Henderson led attendees in the pledge of allegiance.

PRESENTATIONS

1. December 2018 Operator of the Month ~ David Krentkowski

Transit Operator Assistant Manager Ron Mackenzie honored Operator David Krentkowski for being selected Operator of the Month for December 2018. He shared stories detailing his superb care to customers and complimented him for his safe driving

skills and professional conduct with customers. (Commissioners Anderson and Keel arrived at 4:10 p.m.)

On behalf of the Board of Commissioners, Chair Henderson thanked Mr. Krentkowski for his service to the community.

Mr. Krentkowski expressed his gratitude for receiving the award.

2. Tacoma Dome Station Parking Survey Results

Community Development Administrator Kim McGilverly presented on the item. She reviewed the parking survey results and provided background information about parking capacity and the demographics of the customers, noting that 85 percent of the customers appear to be Pierce County residents and 78 percent are Sound Transit customers.

Ms. McGilverly also reviewed the timeline of this project, starting back from Dec. 2015 to current and noted that the parking study conducted recommended a fee-based parking program with market rates.

Ms. McGilverly noted that staff's recommendation is to reserve 200 parking stalls for paid permit parking with a suggested market-based pricing between \$60-\$100/month.

Next steps will include a Title VI analysis, more public process, a public hearing with adoption scheduled in April of 2019.

A question and answer period ensued about the overall management of the parking plan, i.e., how would the parking demand be managed, how will customers be handled coming from outside of the service area to park in the garage.

Ms. McGilverly noted that staff is working through those details and will be returning with a Parking Permit Proposal and Title VI Review at the February 11, 2019 Board Meeting.

CEO Dreier announced that the next steps will be to bring the proposal before the Board for consideration. There was no objection from the Board.

3. Update on Downtown to Defiance Pilot Project

Business Partnership Administrator Penny Grellier and Senior Planner Max Henkle presented on the item. They reviewed the history of the project and the ridership data during the pilot project.

At the end of the presentation, staff recommended to discontinue this project and not operationalize it, noting partner organizations were unable to continue with financial support, ridership is low, and the cost per service hour is too high. It was also noted that riders and members of the community did appreciate this service, however, unfortunately it didn't yield feasible results.

Various Commissioners thanked staff for their willingness to try this pilot project although it did not yield results to operationalize it.

A discussion ensued about how ridership could be improved in the future should Pierce Transit wish to test the waters again on this project.

PUBLIC HEARING

Surplus of 84 Vehicles

Executive Director of Maintenance Skip Huck presented on the item. He reported that the vehicles on the proposed list have reached the end of their useful life.

Chair Henderson provided public hearing directions to attendees and opened the public hearing at 4:51 p.m.

There were no comments provided. The public hearing was closed at 4:51 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Chair Henderson provided directions for participating in public comment and the following individuals spoke:

- Tammy Cox, Lakewood, reported that lighting is needed at certain bus shelters and reported on various behaviors that were occurring on the bus or at bus shelters, such as smoking, the smell of marijuana, animals on the bus without animal service vests.
- Cinderella Helga, Lakewood, noted that she was recently passed up at a bus stop and believes that because the stop is located at the top of the hill, it was easy for the bus operator to not see her. She provided the Clerk of the Board with an example of a plastic umbrella bag to store wet umbrellas so that the seats and aisles do not get wet from wet umbrellas on the bus.
- Hally Bert, representative of Downtown on the Go (DTOG) and frequent rider of the Pierce Transit system, expressed that DTOG and other transit advocates enthusiastically support the proposed BRT project; however, they believe the project could be improved by continuing the existing Route 1 from TCC to UW Tacoma to serve destinations throughout downtown Tacoma rather than requiring riders to hop off and get a transfer on certain blocks. She noted DTOG supports the Center Alignment proposal for the BRT as they believe this option best supports pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit users over single occupant drivers. She suggested that continual outreach to the riders of the Route 1 to receive input is important to the success of the project and encouraged staff to continue with their outreach efforts.
- Walt Hurd, Tacoma, suggested that the Downtown to Defiance Trolley run during the holidays and Easter. He reported that smoking is still occurring at the bus stops.

ACTION AGENDA

1. **FS 2019-004, Authority to Execute the First Amendment to the Development and Option Agreement for Purposes of Entering into and Executing a Real Property Lease with Multi-Service Center and Shelter Resources Inc. (MSC) for a Portion of the Property At 1319 East 72nd Street, Tacoma, Washington For Development of Housing for Veterans**

Senior Planner Janine Robinson presented on the item. She reviewed the history of the project and noted the proposed extension would allow MSC to complete their financing.

A lengthy discussion ensued about why MSC has not obtained financing and how would extending the lease an additional six months result in the company obtaining financing.

Several Commissioners expressed concern about the property being tied up and out of circulation from other potential developers.

Ms. Robinson noted that MSC needs to have a site in order to achieve funding and also reported that there has been no interest from other developers for this property. She responded to various questions pertaining to the terms of the contract.

Commissioners Farris and Anderson **moved** and seconded to not extend the option agreement and authorize staff to issue an RFP for a Transit Oriented Development project.

Motion **carried**, 6-0.

2. **FS 2019-005, Authorizing Amendment No. 6 with Technical Security Integration to Extend the Contract Term to August 31, 2019 and Increase the Not to Exceed Amount to \$1,206,894**

Physical Security Systems Specialist Shane See provided an overview of the contract history. (*Commissioner Dammeier arrived at 5:40 p.m.*) He noted that due to an aging security system and integrated infrastructure, staff did not fully anticipate the costs for repairs and equipment replacements outside of the planned monthly maintenance costs. As a result, expenditures have exceeded the authorized contract amount by \$281,894.

The proposed contract extension would extend the contract to August 31, 2019 and seeks an additional funds of \$175,000. During the extension period, staff will be issuing an RFP and will negotiate a new contract.

He responded to questions pertaining to the project over-runs indicating that overruns were attributed to system degradation. He noted that moving forward the security system will be on a life-cycle plan.

Upon inquiry, he explained the various security and monitoring systems.

Commissioners Dammeier and Mello **moved** and seconded to authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute Amendment No. 6 with Technical Security Integration to extend the contract term to August 31, 2019 and increase the not to exceed amount to \$1,206,894.

Commissioner Keel noted that he is supporting this item under the premise that when a new contract is secured that staff does the professional work to ensure that the security system is maintained properly.

Motion **carried**, 7-0.

3. **FS 2019-006, Authority to Execute an Amended Interlocal Agreement with Pierce County Sheriff's Department for Law Enforcement Services**

Executive Director of Service Delivery and Support Mike Griffus presented on the item. He discussed the contract history and noted the substantive changes of the proposed amendment involve staffing levels, contains some clean-up language pertaining to transition from extra duty, and the clean-up of redlines from the previous agreement. He noted that there is no change to the term of the contract period. The proposed amendment does eliminate the Deputy Chief position in turn for a patrol officer for the Pierce Transit system.

Mr. Griffus reported that Pierce Transit has a new Police Chief, Chief Jim Kelly. He detailed his background and education and introduced Chief Kelly.

Chief Jim Kelly noted his appreciation for being selected Police Chief.

Chair Henderson welcomed Chief Kelly on behalf of the Board.

A discussion ensued about the value of the dog and how often the dog is used.

Chief Kelly noted that he intends to show the value of the dog, noting that buses and transit centers are soft targets. He noted he plans to utilize the dog in the Pierce Transit system.

CEO Dreier reminded the Board that this is not a new contract and that Pierce Transit is still awaiting the study on police services. She noted that the Board will see the results of the study before a new contract is negotiated with the Pierce County Sheriff's Department. She also noted that the Sheriff's Department was gracious enough to allow for the elimination of the Deputy Chief position in return for more service on the street.

Chair Henderson provided a short recap about contractual concerns the Board had about staffing and the dog when negotiating the current police services contract.

Commissioners Farris and Keel **moved** and seconded to approve Resolution No. 2019-003, authorizing the CEO to enter into and execute an amended interlocal agreement with Pierce County Sheriff's Department for Law Enforcement Services in substantially the same form as attached in Exhibit A, retroactive to January 1, 2019, and extending through December 31, 2020 with an optional one- year extension.

Motion **carried**, 7-0.

STAFF UPDATES/DISCUSSION

CEO's Report

CEO Dreier thanked the Board for their engagement this evening,

Ms. Dreier distributed a brochure/schedule of BRT open houses. She noted that Pierce Transit has an interactive website page for citizens to comment on the BRT station locations and lane configurations. She reported that after this round of open houses and results from the website survey, staff will come back to the Board with the results and a recommendation for station locations and lane configurations. She noted this is the last piece of information needed for the Small Starts Grant with the Federal Transportation Administration. She reported that due to the Federal Government shutdown, Pierce Transit has received a delay in receiving its rating for this project from the FTA and that if the Federal Government doesn't get back to work soon, it could delay the BRT project approximately a years, however, the timeline for the project to be completed is fourth quarter of 2022.

Ms. Dreier reported that staff is planning the Board Retreat towards the end of March and encouraged the Commissioners to respond to the survey that was sent by the Clerk of the Board

for possible retreat dates. The agenda is being planned and it will contain continued discussion on the Pierce Transit boundary and taxing authority. She also encouraged the Commissioners to bring forward any agenda items they may want to discuss at the Retreat.

Ms. Dreier shared that the Agency recently held a year-end celebration for the work that employees completed in 2018 and noted fun facts about various accomplishments. She reported that ridership was up 1.2 percent overall in 2018.

She reported that the Agency's priorities for 2019 are as follows:

- Ridership growth and opportunities to serve more folks.
- Wellness and reaching the Well-city Award
- Professional development and succession planning.

INFORMATIONAL BOARD ITEMS

Chair Report

Chair Henderson complimented staff on the Report to the Community that was recently distributed, noting that it showcased Pierce Transit in a positive way.

Sound Transit Update

Commissioners Keel reported on the following items:

- The 2019 Budget was passed that includes monies for the Federal Way extension, the Tacoma Link extension to the Hilltop area, and the Tacoma Dome Link extension.
- Sound Transit is providing flyers to members in its service area updating them on the ST projects
- New leadership of the Board

Commissioner Dammeier noted that Mayor Ron Lucas from Steilacoom has requested to be removed from the Sound Transit Board and so he will be appointing someone new from Pierce County to fill this leadership position. He also reported that he plans to appoint Mayor Kim Roscoe from the City of Fife to the Sound Transit Board. Commissioner Dammeier applauded all the work that Mayor Lucas has done in the community and around Transit.

PSRC Transportation Policy Board Update

Commissioner Mello provided information on the following items:

- SR 900/I-90 Eastgate project was approved
- Low Carbon Fuel Standard
- Planning and impacts relating to the Viaduct closure

Commissioners' Comments

Commissioner Anderson inquired as to whether Pierce Transit was experiencing difficulties in filling operator positions. He suggested that Piece Transit work with Bates College and Clover Park Technical Schools to develop an operator/training program.

Commissioner Keel announced that he was recently appointed to the Governor's Transportation Demand Management Board to look at transportation solutions across the state. He indicated the first meeting is February 7, 2019, and briefly talked about the purpose of this board.

Commissioner Farris inquired about whether Pierce Transit staff could work with the State Auditor's Office to register Pierce Transit riders to vote.

General Counsel Henderson advised that Pierce Transit can't take on voter registration and it would put the Agency in conflict with the Public Disclosure Commission (PDC). Ms. Henderson noted that if an independent, third-party wanted to assist with voter registration utilizing a Pierce Transit Facilities Use Permit, staff could look into the viability of that.

BACKGROUND:

From time to time, Pierce Transit surpluses rolling stock that has exceeded its useful life for public transit and in the past, Pierce Transit has sold surplus rolling stock at auction for relatively small amounts, because when a vehicle is surplus, it typically is beyond its reasonable service life and usually has little to no appreciable market value. Certain non-profit organizations have expressed a need for and interest in utilizing Pierce Transit's surplus vehicles to provide transportation services to Pierce County residents and visitors.

Pierce Transit has identified the above-listed surplus vehicle as having potential to meet the needs of non-profit organizations based on the vehicle's mileage and maintenance history.

By Resolution 15-068, the Board of Commissioners created the Care-a-van program that provides for the donation of surplus vehicles to certain non-profit organizations expected to utilize the vehicle to defray the cost of Pierce Transit's service, since many of those organizations would be providing trips that would otherwise be provided by Pierce Transit, including trips that would be SHUTTLE eligible. Through the Care-a-van vehicle donation program, interested non-profit organizations have applied for the surplus vehicles through a competitive selection process. In the most recent round of applications, Staff received two applications, has ranked those applications based on established criteria, and recommends awarding this vehicle to Dave Purchase Project based on the strength of this organization's application and ranking.

After review and a competitive assessment of the applications, Staff recommends the award of a Care-a-van vehicle to Dave Purchase Project. This organization has demonstrated the financial capacity to follow all state and federal laws regarding maintaining and insuring the vehicle and has provided a description of how the vehicle will best meet the transportation needs of Pierce County residents and visitors. This non-profit organization is also able to sign a contract in substantially the same form as Exhibit A hereto.

The Dave Purchase Project provides services to individuals with substance abuse disorder, particularly those who use opioids. This Care-A-Van vehicle will be used daily to transport clients throughout Pierce County to treatment facilities, and to physical, behavioral and social service appointments. Most clients are low/no income, many are experiencing homelessness and/or are unstably housed.

Applications from organizations that meet donation requirements, but which did not score high enough to be recommended for a vehicle at this time, will be kept on file and considered for future donations.

ALTERNATIVES:

An alternative would be to not award this vehicle, in which case, staff will sell the vehicle(s) at auction.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution No. 2019-005 awarding a Care-a-van vehicle to Dave Purchase Project, subject to the terms and conditions of the Care-a-van Agreement in substantially the same form as Exhibit A hereto.

THIS AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) dated as of March 11, 2019 (the “Effective Date”) is made by and between Pierce County Public Transportation Benefit Area, a Washington municipal corporation (“Pierce Transit”) and Dave Purchase Project a Washington nonprofit corporation with the mission of providing services to individuals with substance abuse disorder, particularly those who use opioids (the “Recipient”)(individually, a “Party” and collectively, the “Parties”) with reference to the following facts:

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Pierce Transit provides public transportation services within Pierce County, Washington; and

WHEREAS, Pierce Transit, from time to time, declares vehicles to be surplus when it has vehicles that have a useful life of more than a year, but has insufficient capacity to continue to maintain, store or insure those vehicles; and

WHEREAS, in order to support its public mission, Pierce Transit desires to increase efficiency, reduce waste and duplication of service and expand and improve the quality of reliable and accessible transportation to better serve the special or other needs of Pierce County residents or visitors to supplement the existing fixed route bus service and paratransit services operated by Pierce Transit within its service area of Pierce County, Washington; and

WHEREAS, an increase in reliable and accessible transportation services will benefit both Pierce Transit and the residents of Pierce County by increasing access to jobs and education, health care, social services and social events for Pierce County residents and better integration of all persons into the economic and social life of the community; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners Resolution No. 15-068, Pierce Transit may, after a competitive evaluation process and subject to Board of Commissioners’ approval, convey title to surplus vehicles to one or more nonprofit corporations that agree to use such vehicle(s) to transport Pierce County residents and visitors on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Recipient submitted an application to the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners (“Application”) for a surplus vehicle that Recipient intends to use to provide 83 (#) trips per month for a term of twelve (12) consecutive months (the “Term”) commencing on the Effective Date to individuals who live, work or travel within Pierce County, which transportation services would, if provided by Pierce Transit, exceed the value the vehicle would otherwise have generated had Pierce Transit disposed of the vehicle at public auction; and

WHEREAS, the disposition of the vehicle to Recipient on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement is intended to improve the transportation services available in Pierce County and enable Pierce Transit to use the cost savings to make other improvements to transportation services provided within its service area.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals and other good and valuable consideration, the Parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. Definitions; Recitals. All capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the same definition as set forth in the Application. Each of the Recitals set forth above is by this reference incorporated herein.
2. Description of the Vehicle. Pierce Transit shall transfer its title to the following described vehicle to Recipient on the Effective Date on the express condition that Recipient provide the transportation services set forth in Section 4 this Agreement during the Term.

As used in this Agreement, the term “Vehicle” means the above-described vehicle together with copies of related maintenance records.

3. Inspection and Evaluation of the Vehicle; “AS IS” Transfer. Pierce Transit has provided Recipient with copies of maintenance records for the Vehicle. Recipient acknowledges that during the Application process it had an opportunity to inspect the Vehicle, and/or had the Vehicle inspected by qualified mechanics of its own choosing. Recipient acknowledges and agrees that Recipient has agreed to enter into this Agreement and accept title to the Vehicle based upon Recipient’s inspection and evaluation of the Vehicle and its suitability for Recipient’s intended purpose. Recipient further acknowledges and agrees that Pierce Transit does not make any representations or warranties of any kind, either express or implied, with respect to the Vehicle, including, but not limited to the size, mileage, quality, configuration or condition of, or accessories for, the Vehicle, accuracy or completeness of records for the Vehicle or compliance with federal, state or local laws, rules and regulations governing motor vehicles, including, but not limited to compliance with air emissions or safety regulations. PIERCE TRANSIT SPECIFICALLY DISCLAIMS ANY REPRESENTATION, WARRANTY OR ASSURANCE WHATSOEVER TO RECIPIENT. PIERCE TRANSIT MAKES NO WARRANTIES OR REPRESENTATIONS OF ANY KIND OR CHARACTER, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION ANY WARRANTIES OR REPRESENTATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THE MAINTENANCE, REPAIR, CONDITION, FUNCTIONALITY, DESIGN, DEFECTS, SOFTWARE, ACCURACY OF DATA OR SENSORS, OR VALUE OF THE VEHICLE INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO (A) ANY IMPLIED OR EXPRESS WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, (B) ANY IMPLIED OR EXPRESS WARRANTY OF FITNESS OR SUITABILITY FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, (C) ANY IMPLIED

OR EXPRESS DUTY OF WORKMANLIKE EFFORT, OF INDEMNIFICATION OR OF LACK OF NEGLIGENCE, OR (D) THE COMPLIANCE OF LACK THEREOF OF THE VEHICLE WITH APPLICABLE GOVERNMENTAL LAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS, IT BEING THE EXPRESS INTENT OF THE PARTIES THAT THE VEHICLE WILL BE TRANSFERRED AND DELIVERED TO RECIPIENT IN ITS PRESENT CONDITION AND STATE OF REPAIR, **“AS IS”, WHERE IS” WITH ALL FAULTS**. RECIPIENT ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT PIERCE TRANSIT HAS NO OBLIGATION TO MAINTAIN, REPAIR, REPLACE OR INSURE THE VEHICLE. THERE IS NO WARRANTY OF TITLE TO THE VEHICLE.

4. Use of the Vehicle. In consideration of Pierce Transit’s transfer of all of its right, title and interest to the Vehicle, Recipient shall at all times during the Term of this Agreement:

(a) use the Vehicle solely to provide a minimum of 18 trips per month for twelve consecutive months providing transportation services for passengers who live, work, or travel within Pierce County as described in Recipient’s application for grant of vehicle at Sec. 2, “Description of Proposed Vehicle’s Use” which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and by this reference incorporated herein. All trips must have an origin or destination within Pierce County. Recipient shall not use the Vehicle to provide general transportation services beyond those described in Section 2 and Exhibit A. Recipient shall not use the Vehicle for any other purpose during the Term of this Agreement without the prior written consent of Pierce Transit, which consent may be granted or withheld by Pierce Transit in its sole discretion.

(b) not accept advertising or use or permit the Vehicle or any transit related facilities associated with the Vehicle including transit shelters, bus stops, or maintenance or storage facilities for such Vehicle to be used in a manner that promotes or opposes a political party, the election of any candidate or group of candidates for federal, state or local government offices, or for the promotion of or opposition to any initiative, referendum or other ballot measures.

(c) at its sole cost and expense, obtain all permits, certificates, licenses and approvals that are required under applicable federal, state and local laws to operate the Vehicle to provide transportation services for persons.

(d) operate and maintain the Vehicle in a safe, sanitary and operable condition and in compliance with all applicable federal, state and local laws. All vehicle parts and accessories must be maintained in a safe and proper working condition at all times. Recipient acknowledges that the Vehicle and associated equipment is subject to inspection as required by federal and state law and may be removed from service if the Vehicle is not being operated or maintained in accordance with applicable legal requirements.

(e) utilize and display the Care-a-van decal on the vehicle, which will be provided by Pierce Transit.

(f) ensure that all drivers operating the Vehicle are properly licensed and identified when operating the Vehicle and have the requisite training, qualification and experience to provide safe and reliable transportation to Recipient’s passengers.

(g) preserve and maintain its legal existence and remain qualified as a nonprofit corporation organized and qualified to do business in the State of Washington exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

(h) comply with all applicable federal and state nondiscrimination laws including but not limited to the Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended from time to time and Title 49.60, RCW, Washington Law Against Discrimination.

(i) not sell, transfer, donate or lease the Vehicle or otherwise allow any person who is not an employee of Recipient to operate or use the Vehicle without the express prior written consent of Pierce Transit, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld if the proposed assignee is a nonprofit corporation with the professional qualifications, financial capacity and creditworthiness to perform the Recipient's obligations hereunder and demonstrates to the satisfaction of Pierce Transit in its sole good faith discretion that the assignee intends to use the Vehicle for a community benefit which improves the transportation services available to Pierce Transit residents comparable to the Recipient's plan of use. The proposed assignee shall also execute an assignment and assumption agreement in form and substance satisfactory to Pierce Transit. Any proposed assignment that fails to comply with the requirements of this Section 4(h) shall be null and void and will have no force and effect.

In the event that Recipient fails to operate, maintain and use the Vehicle in accordance with the provisions of this Section 4, the Parties acknowledge that Pierce Transit would be damaged by such failure by the loss of the estimated sales price it would have received had the Vehicle been sold at public auction and the resulting transportation needs of the passengers Recipient had agreed to transport during the Term, which actual damages would be extremely difficult or impracticable to determine. Therefore by entering into this Agreement, the Parties acknowledge that the Estimated Fair Market Value of the Vehicle set forth in Section 2 above has been agreed upon, after negotiation, as liquidated damages and as the Parties' reasonable estimate of Pierce Transit's monetary damages in the event of a default by Recipient. Any violation of the terms of this Agreement, including, but not limited to the terms of this Section 4, shall constitute an Event of Default under this Agreement and Pierce Transit shall have the right to exercise the rights and remedies set forth in Sections 7(b) and 9 below.

5. Reports. During the Term of this Agreement, Recipient shall provide Pierce Transit with a complete and accurate report on or before the 10th of each month, containing Vehicle odometer readings, number of passengers carried, hours and miles of service and description of trip purpose(s) made by the Vehicle. For purposes of determining the number of qualifying trips, only trips that have an origin or destination within Pierce County shall be included in the monthly reports. Reports shall be submitted to Penny Grellier, Business Partnership Administrator, Pierce Transit, 3701 96th St SW, Lakewood, WA 98499, or emailed to pgrellier@piercetransit.org. Recipient shall also maintain accurate and complete records relating to its ownership, operation and maintenance of the Vehicle including, but not limited to, maintenance records, drivers' logs and hours of service, and pay all fees and file all reports with federal and state regulators as may be required under applicable federal and state law.

6. Photo and Media Release. Pierce Transit make take a photo or photos of the donated vehicle, or the Care-a-van grant Recipient's representatives, at a public meeting or at other venues. Recipient and its representatives consent to Pierce Transit's use of your name, photo and/or likeness for the purpose of

promoting public transportation and the Care-a-van program in advertising, social media, brochures, and the like.

7. Insurance and Security.

(a) At all times during the Term of this Agreement, Recipient shall, at its sole cost and expense, obtain and maintain in full force and effect, the insurance set forth in Exhibit B.

(b) As security for the performance of its obligations under this Agreement, Recipient shall deposit cash, letter of credit, a bond, or other financial security reasonably acceptable to Pierce Transit in the amount of the Estimated Fair Market Value of the Vehicle set forth in Section 2 above (the "Deposit"). The Deposit shall be held by Pierce Transit to secure the faithful performance by Recipient of all of the terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement to be kept by Recipient during the Term. If Recipient defaults with respect to any provision of this Agreement, including, but not limited to provisions dealing with insurance, reporting or use of the Vehicle, Pierce Transit may (but shall not be required to) use, apply or retain all or any part of the Deposit for the payment of any amount which Pierce Transit may spend by reason of Recipient's default or to compensate Pierce Transit for any other loss or damage which Pierce Transit may suffer by reason of Recipient's default, including, but not limited to, payment of liquidated damages in the amount set forth in Section 2 above. Pierce Transit shall not be required to keep this Deposit separate from its general funds and Recipient shall not be entitled to interest on such deposit. If Recipient shall fully and faithfully perform all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Pierce Transit shall return the Deposit or any balance thereof to Recipient within thirty (30) days following the expiration of the Term of this Agreement.

8. Indemnification.

(a) Recipient assumes all liability and all risk of loss resulting from its acceptance of title to the Vehicle and the use and the operation of the Vehicle in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Recipient acknowledges and agrees that Pierce Transit shall have no liability in the event that the Vehicle or any equipment associated therewith is damaged, destroyed, lost or stolen for any reason whatsoever.

(b) Recipient agrees to protect, defend, indemnify and hold Pierce Transit and its appointed and elected officials, officers and employees harmless to the maximum extent possible under law. Accordingly, Recipient agrees for itself, its successors and assigns to protect, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Pierce Transit, its appointed and elected officials, officers and employees from and against any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, sums paid in settlement of any of the foregoing, judgments, losses, damages, injuries, liabilities, penalties, enforcement actions, fines, taxes, liens, encumbrances, costs or expenses (including without limitation, reasonable attorney's fees and costs of defense) and claims for personal injury, death or property damage which is caused by, arises out of or is related to any use of the Vehicle or the exercise of rights under this Agreement by Recipient or any of its officers, members, agents or employees. Recipient's obligation under this Section 8 shall include: (a) Indemnification for such claims whether or not they arise from the sole negligence of either Pierce Transit or Recipient, the concurrent negligence of both Parties, or the negligence of one or more third parties; (b) The duty to promptly accept tender of defense and provide defense to Pierce Transit at Recipient's own expense; (c) Indemnification of claims made by Recipient's own employees or agents; and (d) Waiver of Recipient's immunity under the industrial insurance provisions of Title 51 RCW, which waiver has been mutually negotiated by the Parties. This indemnification has been the subject of specific negotiation between the Parties and shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

In the event it is necessary for Pierce Transit to incur attorneys' fees, legal expenses or other costs to enforce the provisions of this Section 8, all such fees, expenses and costs shall be paid by Recipient.

9. Damage, Loss, or Destruction of Vehicle. In the event that the Vehicle is damaged, lost or destroyed for any reason during the Term of this Agreement, Recipient shall immediately notify Pierce Transit of the occurrence and the extent of the damage and availability of insurance proceeds to repair or replace the Vehicle. Unless Pierce Transit agrees otherwise, the insurance proceeds shall be used solely to repair the Vehicle to substantially the condition it was in immediately prior to such damage or destruction or purchase a replacement vehicle in size and utility comparable to the Vehicle that was damaged or destroyed in which event this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and Recipient shall use the replacement vehicle solely for the purposes set forth in Section 4 above for the remainder of the Term of this Agreement. In the event that the Vehicle is not repaired or replaced, the insurance proceeds shall be paid first to Pierce Transit in the amount of the Estimated Fair Market Value of the Vehicle set forth in Section 2 above, the remainder shall be retained by Recipient, this Agreement shall terminate and except as otherwise expressly provided herein, neither Party shall have any further rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement. In accord with Section 7 of this agreement, upon termination due to a Vehicle not being repaired or replaced, provided that Recipient has fully and faithfully performed all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement (including payment of any insurance proceeds) Pierce Transit shall return the deposit cash, letter of credit, a bond, or other financial security Deposit or any balance thereof to Recipient within thirty (30) days following the termination of the Agreement.

10. Events of Default; Remedies; DAMAGE EXCLUSIONS AND LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY.

(a) The occurrence of any of the following events shall constitute an "Event of Default" under this Agreement:

(1) The failure by Recipient to (i) obtain any license, permit or certificate required under applicable law, (ii) pay any fee, or (iii) maintain the insurance required to be provided under Exhibit B to this Agreement which failure continues for a period of ten (10) days after the date such performance or payment was due; or

(2) The failure of Recipient to perform any other covenants, conditions or terms of this Agreement where such failure has continued for thirty (30) days after written notice from Pierce Transit

(b) Upon the occurrence of an Event of Default, Pierce Transit shall have the right to the following remedies:

(1) enforce the provisions of this Agreement through injunctive, declaratory or other equitable relief and/or an action for specific performance, it being understood and agreed between the Parties that the non-monetary obligations of Recipient set forth in this Agreement are unique and that monetary damages would be an insufficient remedy for their breach, and/or

(2) Obtain monetary damages in the amount of the Estimated Fair Market Value of the Vehicle set forth in Section 2 of this Agreement as liquidated damages and not as a penalty and Pierce Transit shall have the right to use and apply the Deposit in payment of such liquidated damages.

(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, whether as a result of breach of contract, tort liability (including negligence), strict liability or any other cause of action, shall either Party be liable to the other Party for indirect, consequential, incidental, special, punitive or exemplary damages of any nature whatsoever, including, but not limited to, losses or damages caused by reason of loss of use, lost profits or revenue, interest charges or cost of capital and each Party expressly releases the other Party therefrom.

(d) IF FOR ANY REASON PIERCE TRANSIT HAS BREACHED THIS AGREEMENT OR IS LIABLE TO RECIPIENT FOR ANY CLAIM (INCLUDING ANY TORT CLAIM), ANY DEMAND, CAUSE OF ACTION, SUIT, SUMS PAID IN SETTLEMENT OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING, JUDGMENT, LOSS, DAMAGE, INJURY, LIABILITY, PENALTY, ENFORCEMENT ACTION, FINE, TAX, LIEN, ENCUMBRANCE, COST OR EXPENSE (INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS OF DEFENSE) OR CLAIM FOR PERSONAL INJURY, DEATH OR PROPERTY DAMAGE WHICH IS CAUSED BY, ARISES OUT OF OR IS RELATED TO ANY USE OF THE VEHICLE (COLLECTIVELY "CLAIMS"), RECIPIENT'S SOLE AND EXCLUSIVE REMEDY AGAINST PIERCE TRANSIT FOR ANY BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT OR ANY SUCH CLAIMS SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE ESTIMATED FAIR MARKET VALUE OF THE VEHICLE SET FORTH IN SECTION 2.

(e) The remedies provided in this Section 10 are intended to be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any other remedies available to Pierce Transit at law and in equity, and Pierce Transit shall have, in addition to the remedies set forth in this Section, all such remedies at law and in equity.

11. Miscellaneous.

(a) This Agreement including Recipient's Application, Exhibits A through B which are attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein, sets forth the entire agreement of the Parties as to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations and understandings between them, both oral and written. No representation, inducement, promise, understanding, condition or warranty not set forth herein has been made or relied upon by either Party. This Agreement may not be amended or rescinded in any manner except by a non-electronic record signed by a duly authorized officer or representative of each Party hereto. The Parties agree that this Agreement shall not be amended in any manner by any course of dealing between the Parties.

(b) This Agreement shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington. In the event any action is brought to enforce any of the provisions of this Agreement, the Parties agree to be subject to exclusive in personam jurisdiction in the Pierce County Superior Court for the State of Washington and agree that in any such action venue shall lie exclusively in Pierce County, Washington.

(c) Should any of the provisions of this Agreement be found to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be stricken and the remainder of this Agreement shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect unless striking such provision shall materially alter the allocation of rights, duties and obligations of the Parties under this Agreement.

(d) No delay or forbearance by a Party in exercising any right or remedy accruing to such Party upon the occurrence of any breach or default by the other Party under this Agreement shall impair any such right or remedy of such Party, nor shall it be construed to be a waiver of any such breach or default, or an acquiescence therein, or of any similar breach or default thereafter occurring, nor shall any waiver of any

single breach or default be deemed a waiver of any other breach or default theretofore or thereafter occurring. No waiver of any right under this Agreement shall be effective unless contained in writing signed by a duly authorized officer or representative of the Party sought to be charged with the waiver and no waiver of any right arising from any breach or failure to perform shall be deemed to be a waiver of any future right or of any other right arising under this Agreement.

(e) The Parties acknowledge that this Agreement was negotiated fairly between them at arms' length and that the final terms of this Agreement are the product of the Parties' negotiations. Each Party represents and warrants that it has sought and received legal counsel of its own choosing with regard to the contents of this Agreement and the rights and obligations affected hereby. The Parties intend that this Agreement is deemed to have been jointly and equally drafted by them, and that the provisions of this Agreement, therefore, should not be construed against any Party on the grounds that such Party drafted or was more responsible for drafting such provision.

(f) The headings and titles of the articles, sections and paragraphs of this Agreement shall not be deemed to limit or supersede any of the terms or provisions of this Agreement. As used in this Agreement the masculine shall include the feminine and neuter, the feminine shall include the masculine and neuter, the neuter shall include the masculine and feminine, the singular shall include the plural and the plural shall include the singular, as the context may require.

(g) The Parties are independent contractors for all purposes, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to create an association, joint venture, trust or partnership, or impose a trust or partnership obligation or liability on or with regard to either Party except that of parties to a contract. Each Party to this Agreement is individually responsible for its own covenants, obligations and liabilities under this Agreement. Each Party shall act hereunder only in its individual capacity and shall not be authorized to act as agent or representative of the other Party nor have the power or authority to bind the other Party for any purpose. No Party shall represent to anyone that it has the authority to bind the other Party, or make any other representation about or on behalf of any other Party.

(h) The provisions of this Agreement are intended solely for the benefit of, and may only be enforced by, the Parties hereto, and their respective successors and permitted assigns. None of the rights or obligations of the Parties herein set forth (or implied) is intended to confer any claim, cause of action, remedy, defense, legal justification, indemnity, contribution claim, set-off, or other right, whatsoever upon or otherwise inure to the benefit of any other person, including but not limited to, any worker, supplier, mechanic, insurer, surety, passenger, customer, invitee, member of the public or other third parties having dealings with either of the Parties or involved, in any manner, with the Vehicle.

(i) Each of the Parties shall from time to time execute and deliver all further documents and instruments and do all things and acts as the other Party may reasonably require to effectively carry out, clarify or more completely evidence or perfect the full intent and meaning of this Agreement.

(j) All notices or requests required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in a non-electronic record (except for notices delivered by facsimile), shall be personally delivered or sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, by nationally recognized overnight courier or by facsimile transmission and shall be deemed given when so delivered, received or faxed (provided the fax machine has issued a printed confirmation of receipt). All notices or requests shall be sent as follows:

(k) Time is of the essence in the performance of each Party's obligations under this Agreement.

(l) WAIVER OF JURY TRIAL. PIERCE TRANSIT AND RECIPIENT HEREBY WAIVE THE RIGHT TO ANY JURY TRIAL IN ANY ACTION, PROCEEDING OR COUNTERCLAIM BROUGHT BY EITHER PIERCE TRANSIT OR RECIPIENT AGAINST THE OTHER.

(m) Each person executing this Agreement in a representative capacity acknowledges, represents and warrants that he or she is an official representative of the entity in whose name he or she is executing this Agreement and that he or she possesses full and complete authority to bind such entity to the full and faithful performance of all conditions, terms, provisions, covenants, warranties and representations as contained in this Agreement.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have caused this Agreement to be executed by their respective officers thereunto duly authorized, as of the date first above written.

EXHIBIT A

Description of Proposed Vehicle's Use

The Care-A-Van vehicle will be used daily to transport clients throughout Pierce County to treatment facilities, and to physical, behavioral and social service appointments. Most clients are low/no income, many are homeless and/or unstably housed, all are struggling with substance use disorder and/or are in recovery.

EXHIBIT B

Insurance

Prior to the Effective Date of this Agreement and delivery of a certificate of title to the Vehicle, Recipient shall procure and maintain, for the Term of this Agreement, insurance or coverage against loss, theft or claims for damage to the Vehicle and coverage against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from and in connection with the rights and privileges granted by this Agreement to Recipient.

By requiring such minimum insurance coverage, Pierce Transit shall not be deemed or construed to have assessed the risks that may be applicable to Recipient under this Agreement. Recipient shall assess its own risks and, if it deems appropriate and/or prudent, maintain greater limits and/or broader coverage.

Nothing contained within these insurance requirements shall be deemed to limit the scope, application and/or limits of the coverage afforded, which coverage will apply to each insured to the full extent provided by the terms and conditions of the policy(s). Nothing contained within this provision shall affect and/or alter the application of any other provision contained within this Agreement.

For All Coverages: The cost of such insurance shall be paid by Recipient. Each insurance policy shall be written on an "Occurrence Form" and Recipient shall be responsible for all deductibles.

(a) Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance. Recipient shall carry (1) comprehensive first party coverage for loss, theft, or damage to the Vehicle in an amount sufficient to cover the estimated Fair Market Value of the Vehicle; and (2) bodily injury and property damage liability insurance covering the Vehicle with a minimum limit of \$1,000,000 combined single limit coverage, \$2,000,000 aggregate. The insurance policy must include a "uniform motor carrier bodily injury and property damage liability certificate of insurance" endorsement and the insurance agency or company must submit evidence of insurance on a "uniform motor carrier bodily injury and property damage liability certificate of insurance (Form E). Recipient shall also carry worker's compensation insurance, as required by the Industrial Insurance Act of the State of Washington and such other insurance as may be required under applicable federal and state law for persons providing the transportation services described in the Agreement.

(b) Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions. The deductible and/or self-insured retention of the policies shall not limit or apply to Recipient's liability to Pierce Transit and shall be the sole responsibility of Recipient.

(c) Other Insurance Provisions. The insurance policies required in this Agreement (other than worker's compensation) are to contain, or be endorsed to contain the following provisions:

1. Pierce Transit, its appointed and elected officers, officials, employees and agents are to be covered as additional insureds as respects liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of Recipient in connection with this Agreement.

2. Insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects Pierce Transit, its appointed and elected officers, officials, employees and agents. Any insurance and/or self-insurance maintained by Pierce Transit, its officers, officials, employees or agents should not contribute with Recipient's insurance or benefit Recipient in any way.

3. Recipient's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made and/or lawsuit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.

(d) All Policies: Coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits prior to the expiration date of this Agreement, unless thirty (30) days prior notice, return receipt requested, has been given to Pierce Transit and the Washington State Utilities and Transportation Commission, if required. The thirty (30) day notice period will commence to run from the date notice is actually received by Pierce Transit and/or the Commission.

(e) Acceptability of Insurers. All insurance must be placed with an insurance company authorized to issue insurance in the state of Washington. Unless otherwise approved by Pierce Transit, insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A: VIII, or, if not rated with Best's, with minimum surpluses the equivalent of Best's surplus size VIII. If at any time, any of the foregoing policies shall fail to meet the above minimum standards, Recipient shall, upon notice to that effect from Pierce Transit, promptly obtain a new policy and shall submit the same to Pierce Transit, with certificates and endorsements for approval.

(f) Verification of Coverage. Recipient shall furnish Pierce Transit with the certificates of insurance required by this Exhibit B prior to transfer of title to the Vehicle.

BACKGROUND:

Providing access to real-time bus schedule information decreases the perceived vs. actual wait times for passengers and improves customer satisfaction. If passengers can learn about a delay as they arrive at the bus stop, they can make informed decisions about taking alternative routes or modes. Per our 2018 Customer Service Survey, customers are generally aware that route and real-time arrival information is available on Pierce Transit's website or on their phones but not all customers have smart phones. Providing real-time information signs at our major facilities will allow ALL customers to have access to accurate schedule information and enhance the rider experience by reducing uncertainty. The signs also communicate service disruptions, detours and other events in real-time so customers can make informed decisions, and decrease demand on our Customer Service Representatives.

In 2018 Pierce Transit received a Provisio Grant from WSDOT in the amount of \$300,000. The Grant expires June 30, 2019. The independent cost estimate for the project was \$239,750. The project was advertised in January 4th. A pre-bid meeting was held on January 24th and bids were due on January 31st. Pierce Transit received one bid from Northeast Electric, LLC. for a total of \$254,791.20.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute a Contract with Northeast Electric, LLC. to provide Real Time Information Sign installation, software, implementation, and training services one year for a not to exceed capital cost of \$254,791.20. The contract will go into effect upon mutual execution of the agreement. A separate contract will be negotiated for on-going repair and maintenance as well as cellular data.

ALTERNATIVES:

BACKGROUND:

The Pacific Avenue S/State Route 7 corridor, where Pierce Transit's most highly utilized fixed route travels (Route 1), experiences high levels of traffic congestion which reduces service reliability and increases travel time. Poor schedule reliability and slow travel times are unattractive to riders and incur increased person delay, wasted fuel, and higher levels of emissions. This project would identify and prioritize investments to improve transit performance and service quality along Pacific Avenue S/State Route 7 (Downtown Tacoma to Spanaway). Specifically, upgrade transit signal priority (TSP) treatments would replace antiquated technology and provide a more intuitive and connected TSP system with the capability to communicate with other on-board systems and remove the necessity of operator interaction in deploying the system.

Route 1 averages 5,950 boardings per weekday or 18.4% of all weekday boardings system wide. It is the highest ridership route that travels Pacific Avenue / SR-7 which is one of the most congested and heavily utilized corridors in Pierce County. It provides links from the southernmost portion of the Pierce Transit service area to Downtown Tacoma, the most populous and frequented destination of Pierce Transit riders. Additionally, frequent connections

are made from this corridor to other identified regional growth centers and manufacturing industrial centers (i.e., Puyallup-South Hill, Puyallup Downtown, Tacoma Mall, and Port of Tacoma). Density is a strong predictor of transit ridership. In order to provide the greatest good to the greatest number of passengers, the corridors of higher density, such as Pacific Avenue/SR 7, should receive more frequent service than those with lower densities. At the same time, the route network should still facilitate access to as much area within Pierce Transit's service area as practical. Our trunk routes, such as Route 1, would benefit from this project, and are designed to be anchored by major destinations such as regional growth centers, preferably at both ends. By improving transit travel time and schedule reliability this project will attract more riders.

This project seeks to build upon the technologies and investments already made by Pierce Transit as well as utilize existing interagency agreements for coordination and project implementation. It seeks to utilize the latest GPS based technologies for more efficient, controlled, and schedule based transit priority strategies while still being backward compatible to the existing Opticom technology and respecting the signal timing specifications of partner jurisdictions. Implementation would occur at the intersections along Pacific Avenue / SR-7 within the City of Tacoma and WSDOT portions of the corridor. It would be forward compatible with any future Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) treatments in the corridor yet could still be utilized by regular Pierce Transit services in the case of a no build option. Existing Opticom technology in the corridor would not need to be removed and can still be utilized by police, fire and emergency services as well as a backup system for transit.

The Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was released on January 18, 2019 to consultants registered on MRSC Rosters and was advertised in The Tacoma Daily Index, Daily Journal of Commerce and OMWBE. Two (2) proposals were received on February 1, 2019 and were evaluated by committee. The committee unanimously agreed that DKS Associates most closely meets the requirements and will provide an excellent solution for this project.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board of Commissioners authorize awarding a contract to DKS Associates.

ALTERNATIVES:

Do not proceed with the Transit Signal Priority Design Engineering Services portion of the project. Significant grant monies that fund significant portion of the project would be lost.

BACKGROUND:

In response to direction in the Federal Transportation Act MAP-21, in 2014 the PSRC Executive Board changed the structure of the Transportation Policy Board so that transit will be represented in a voting capacity. The new board structure eliminated the non-voting transit agency seats and added five voting seats: one regional seat for Sound Transit and one specifically designated local transit seat for each county. According to current PSRC Policy Board Appointment Policy, voting members must be elected officials, so all five seats and alternates must be filled with elected officials appointed by the transit boards to specifically represent transit interests. For the regional transit seat, the appointment will be made by the Sound Transit Board. For the countywide transit seats, the appointment will be made by the Board of the largest transit agency in the county, but the member will represent all transit interests and providers within the county. Pierce Transit serves as the largest transit agency in Pierce County.

Each year, the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners elects a primary and alternate representative to serve on the Puget Sound Regional Council Transportation Policy Board. The term of these appointments shall be from January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019. At the December 19, 2019 Board meeting, the Board agreed to hold off on making the appointment to this Board until February so that there would be a full complement of the Board. As information, in 2018 Commissioner Ryan Mello served as the primary representative and Commissioner Rick Talbert served as the alternate representative.

As information, the Transportation Policy Board advises the Executive Board of the Puget Sound Regional Council on transportation issues pursuant to federal and state legislation and appropriate related concerns of jurisdictions, citizens, and other interests. Transit-related work of the TPB includes, but is not limited to:

- Updating the metropolitan transportation plan, including transit elements (Transportation 2040 and successor documents),
- Recommending Executive Board action on federal transportation funds;
- Taking action on the findings of conformance to new Sound Transit System Plan before a public vote, as required by state law;
- Reviewing and commenting on annual transit coordination reports and other transit-related documents that are presented to the TPB; and
- Discussing and making recommendations on emerging transportation issues.

The PSRC Transportation Policy Board meets the second Thursday of each month from 9:30 – 11:30 a.m. at the Puget Sound Regional Council office located at 1011 Western Ave., 5th Floor, Seattle. The next meeting is Thursday, February 14, 2019.








