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1	BE IT REMEMBERED that on Wednesday,
2	June 29, 2016, at 3720 96th Street Southwest, Rainier
3	Conference Room, Lakewood, Washington, at 6:06 p.m.,
4	the following proceedings were had, to wit:
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8	MS. DREIER: So good evening.
9	Thank you for coming. My name is I think I've met
10	everybody in the room. I'm Sue Dreier, the CEO of
11	Pierce Transit. And because there's not currently a
12	chair for this group, I will go ahead and call the
13	2016 Pierce Transit board composition review meeting
14	to order at 6:07.
15	So what is the purpose of today's meeting? Okay,
16	where am I getting on my slides here? I'll get my
17	assistant to get my slides going. Thank you.
18	Thank you. So, by law, every four years, the
19	composition of Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners
20	is to be reviewed.
21	MR. TALBERT: Hey, Sue.
22	MS. DREIER: Yes.
23	MR. TALBERT: Before you do that,
24	maybe we should just go around and introduce ourselves.
25	MS. DREIER: That's next.

1 MR. TALBERT: Oh. 2 MS. DREIER: I was going to wait just 3 so we can make sure -- I'm only doing a little bit, and 4 then we're going to do introductions. 5 MR. TALBERT: All right. 6 MS. DREIER: I'm assuming others 7 would come in. It looks like one person did. 8 Okay. So here, this is the law. By the law, the 9 Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners has to be reviewed 10 by a body convened for a single purpose of deciding 11 whether the composition of the board should stay the 12 same as it is today or change. So at this point, I 13 would like to take roll call by self-introduction. 14 MR. TALBERT: Great idea. 15 MS. DREIER: Isn't that a good idea? 16 Thank you. Would we like to start over here? 17 MR. ANDERSON: Don Anderson. Don 18 Anderson, City of Lakewood. 19 MR. CURTIS: Tim Curtis, City of Fife. 20 MR. WITTNER: Brent Wittner, City of 21 Fircrest. 22 MR. KEEL: Kent Keel, City of 23 University Place. 24 MR. TALBERT: Rick Talbert, Pierce 25 County.

1 MS. SHADKO: Heather Shadko, City of 2 Puyallup. 3 MR. WAGNER: Rich Wagner, City of 4 Auburn. 5 MR. EIDINGER: Daryl Eidinger, City 6 of Edgewood. 7 MS. NANCY HENDERSON: Nancy 8 Henderson, Town of Steilacoom. 9 MR. RICHARDSON: Doug Richardson, 10 Pierce County Council. 11 MS. DREIER: Okay. That's everybody 12 in attendance. So that's one, two, three, four, five, 13 six, seven, eight, nine -- ten. So we have ten. So it 14 means that, by a vote, we would need six for a vote to 15 pass tonight. 16 With that being said, am I going to do a chair 17 nomination now, Deanne, or are you? 18 MS. JACOBSON: I can do it, but let 19 you finish your part. 20 MS. DREIER: Okay. So the county 21 council is -- all county councilors are invited to 22 attend the meeting, as is one representative from each 23 of the cities in our PTBA, in our boundary. As I said, 24 a quorum of 50 percent of those of you present at the 25 beginning of the meeting -- so tonight that's ten --

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which would be six of you, to take any action to change
 the Pierce board composition.

So as you can see, here's the law that says every four years that we do this. The last board composition meeting was in 2007, that looked like this one. The outcome of that board, of that meeting, remained that the board remained the same.

8 And then you may recall that in 2013, we had 9 another board composition meeting, but it was under the 10 form of a PTIC, the Public Transportation Improvement 11 Committee. And at that meeting, some of the communities 12 in the boundary area decided to leave. At that time, 13 the board composition did shift a bit, as several -- as the cities had left. So that composition that was 14 15 determined at the PTIC in 2012 still exists today.

16 So the purpose of this meeting, as I said, is to 17 look at the composition and have this body decide 18 whether that's the correct composition or not. So there 19 are two possible outcomes of tonight's meeting: The 20 makeup of the board changes or the makeup of the board 21 stays the same. We can only have nine Board of 22 Commissioners at the end of tonight.

With that being said, I'll let Deanne go ahead. We need a chair for this meeting. So Deanne will do the nominations of the chair.

1 MS. JACOBSON: Yes. Thank you. So 2 the next order is for this body to elect a chair to 3 preside over this meeting. So with that, I will open up nominations for who would like to preside. 4 5 MR. ANDERSON: I nominate -- I nominate Rick Talbert the chair of Pierce -- or 6 7 immediate past chair of Pierce Transit Board. 8 MS. JACOBSON: Any other nominations? 9 Okav. Seeing none, then it looks like Rick Talbert 10 will preside as the chair. 11 MR. TALBERT: All right. Thank you. 12 MS. JACOBSON: And I'm going to give 13 you a script. 14 MR. TALBERT: Oh. Perfect. 15 MS. DREIER: We'll give you a script. 16 This meeting only lasts -- it only -- it happens every 17 four years, so we have to remember we had very minimal 18 notes from when it happened the last time. 19 MR. TALBERT: Okay. All right. So 20 looking at the script here, our first item is approval 21 of the minutes from March 28th, 2007, which have been 22 included in your packet, written in Sanskrit, by the 23 So, but at this time, I would entertain a motion way. 24 to approve those minutes. 25 MR. KEEL: I move approval.

1 MR. RICHARDSON: Second. 2 MR. TALBERT: Been properly moved and 3 seconded to accept the minutes as presented from March 28. 4 5 Are there any questions or comments concerning the 6 minutes? Seeing none, all those in favor say "aye." 7 MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: Aye. 8 MR. TALBERT: Those opposed? All 9 right. The motion carries. 10 Next item on this evening's agenda is a staff 11 report. We're going to have Deanne -- Deanne Jacobson 12 is going to give the staff report. 13 MS. JACOBSON: Yes. On the board 14 composition. Mm-hmm. Thank you. 15 So the Pierce Transit Board, obviously their charge 16 is to -- they're the policymakers of the board and they 17 oversee the governance of Pierce Transit. So right on the slide here is our current 18 19 composition as the board is today. And so we have two 20 members from the City of Tacoma, one member from the 21 City of Lakewood, and two members from Pierce County 22 Council, one member from City of Puyallup, one member from University Place, and we have an at-large member 23 24 that represents Fife, Milton, and Edgewood, and another 25 at-large member that represents Auburn, Fircrest, Gig

1 Harbor, Pacific, Ruston, Steilacoom. So that's the 2 current composition that we have today. 3 MR. TALBERT: Okay. Are there any 4 questions or comments on the current makeup of the board? 5 6 Okay. So after discussion, ask for a motion to 7 maintain or change the board's composition. Is that the 8 next item? 9 MS. DREIER: Well, first we're going 10 to do an overview. So the next agenda item -- I don't 11 know if it's on your script -- is overview of Pierce 12 Transit service area, ridership, and population. 13 MR. TALBERT: Call on Sue Dreier. 14 MS. DREIER: Thank you. 15 So for some of you in the room, you may not be aware of the services of Pierce Transit. So I just 16 wanted to go over a few slides that I've been presenting 17 18 out in the community. We love to show off this bus. 19 This is a twin coach. This bus actually was in service 20 when it was the City of Tacoma bus service way back and 21 put over a million miles on that bus before it was 22 retired. 23 And then Pierce County Public Transportation 24 Benefit Area was incorporated and founded in 1979. We cover 279 square miles in Pierce County, and we provide 25

1	what we call fixed route, which are the big busses with
2	the routes that you see around; Shuttle Paratransit,
3	that's the on-demand service that are for those who are
4	unable to use the fixed-route bus because a disabling
5	condition; and then we provide over 300 vanpools that
6	either originate or end in Pierce County.
7	So who are our customers? The average age from the
8	last survey is 34. 39 percent have no working vehicle.
9	However, I like to kind of turn that upside down and say
10	61 percent of the people that ride the bus do have a
11	working vehicle and choose to ride. 44 percent of our
12	folks that ride have incomes of under 20,000. And they
13	go to work, school, and recreation on the bus.
14	This is our current service area. As I said, 292
15	square miles, 12 cities and towns, and big portions of
16	unincorporated Pierce County. We actually cover 70
17	percent of Pierce County's population, and we have
18	infrastructure in all of those areas, whether that's a
19	bus stop, a shelter, or a transit station.
20	This is a system map, and you can see it's I
21	think that we have some around on the tables, which will
22	show where our fixed-route system goes. In general, the
23	service area is defined by our fixed-route system. The
24	Paratransit system only runs within three-quarters of a
25	mile of a fixed route. That's how the ADA laws were

1 created.

2 And next, this is service by the numbers. 3 Currently we have 37 local routes. 140 busses roll out 4 at peak time. We carry over nine million people a year, with 400 -- over 432,000 annual service hours, of which 5 6 we're growing right now. A hundred vehicles that serve 7 that Paratransit. 368,000 annual boardings on that. 8 And then a pretty robust vanpool of, as I said, 366 vans, which carry 849 annual boardings. That's 849,000 9 10 people that are not in their personal vehicle on the 11 freeway.

12 How come I'm not clicking through? There we go. 13 So we wanted to highlight the population for our PTBA. And this is all the small cities and Tacoma and 14 15 unincorporated Pierce County of which we serve. And I 16 will point out that Auburn, Milton, and Pacific, it 17 says "part" because part of the population of those 18 areas belong to Pierce Transit and the other part 19 belongs to King County. So those numbers are what we go 20 on.

And then the next number that I want to bring to everyone's attention is the population by our current board representation. And what we've done is broken this into percentages. I thought it was an easier way to look at it. So as Deanne said earlier, University

1	Place has one seat and then Pacific, Auburn, Ruston,
2	Fircrest, Steilacoom, and Gig Harbor are all represented
3	by one person, and that is about six percent of the
4	population. So if you equal all that, it's a hundred
5	percent.
6	And I believe that was what we were going to
 7	present tonight. And then I want to go back, actually,
8	to that last slide, so we'll just leave it up there.
9	Can I go back to any slides, or?
10	I'm going to go back to the last one and leave it
11	up there. There we go.
12	MR. TALBERT: Okay.
13	MS. DREIER: And now the discussion
14	ensues.
15	MR. TALBERT: So now we can have a
16	discussion.
17	So any thoughts or comments on the information that
18	we just were presented by Sue and the current makeup of
19	the Transit board? Any thoughts? I'll jump oh. Don.
20	MR. ANDERSON: Well, I believe a few
21	of us were at PTIC four years ago, and there was a
22	realignment. There was much discussion. And it's
23	worked. I think that the the current makeup has been
24	effective. It's given a voice to the outlying
25	communities, a little bit greater proportion than

1	formerly did. But that hasn't been abused at all.
2	There's not been any internal politics of people ganging
3	up and forming factions. It's been a real thoughtful
4	effort at extended transit service, in some cases on
5	sort of a test basis to try to find some things that
6	work. And I would hope that we leave it alone.
7	MR. TALBERT: Okay. Other thoughts,
8	comments? Okay.
9	I'll share mine, I guess, because I was going to
10	make similar comments to the ones that Mayor Anderson
11	just made. Going through the PTIC process, one of the
12	concerns or criticisms that was raised by a number of
13	communities in Pierce County within the transit
14	boundary, leading into that was that there wasn't a
15	voice for certain communities.
16	And at that time, we did make a change. Pierce
17	County, prior to that, had three seats. The City of
18	Tacoma also had three seats. Both of those entities
19	gave up seats that ultimately became the
20	Edgewood/Milton/Fife seat and created a permanent seat
21	for both University Place and Puyallup. Do I have that
22	right? Yeah.
23	And so I would agree with Don, that, you know, it's
24	been a few years, and things seem to be working pretty
25	well. Pierce Transit is still climbing out of the

	1	recession and we're still rebuilding our service. Quite
	2	frankly, having a broader base and broader voice on the
	3	board I think has helped us as we've rebuilt things. So
	4	I think we should also leave it as is at this point and
	5	let things continue as we continue to build out. That
	6	would be my recommendation.
	7	All right. No one else? Commissioner Keel, or
	8	Council Member Keel.
	9	MR. KEEL: Thank you.
	10	MR. TALBERT: Deputy Mayor Keel.
	11	MR. KEEL: Thank you, Chair.
	12	So I would I would like to make a motion. I
	13	move to keep the current composition of the Pierce
	14	Transit Board of Commissioners as is, because the
	15	current composition is appropriate for the Pierce
	16	Transit Board.
	17	MS. SHADKO: I'll second that.
	18	MR. TALBERT: Okay. There's been a
	19	motion made and seconded to keep the Pierce Transit
	20	Board of Directors with the current board composition.
	21	Is there any questions or comments on the motion? I
	22	don't see any.
·	23	All those in favor, signify by saying "aye."
	24	MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: Aye.
	25	MR. TALBERT: Those opposed? Motion

1	carries.
2	With that vote, this body has deemed it appropriate
3	to maintain the composition of the Pierce Transit Board.
4	And at this time, I would entertain a motion to
5	adjourn.
6	MR. RICHARDSON: So moved.
7	MR. KEEL: Second.
8	MR. TALBERT: It's been properly
9	moved and seconded to adjourn. Seeing no further
10	comments, all those in favor say "aye."
11	MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: Aye.
12	MR. TALBERT: Those opposed? We are
13	adjourned.
