BACKGROUND:

Staff requests authority to execute a two-year extension of our current Maintenance and Support Agreement for our current CAD/AVL system with Conduent Transportation Solutions, Inc.

Pierce Transit uses the CAD/AVL System to manage its fixed route bus service, Para-transit SHUTTLE service, maintenance services, and facilities activities. It is also used to coordinate emergency and other Public Safety activities. This system allows Pierce Transit to optimize the use of staff and equipment throughout our service area. This system is critical to the operation of our business.

The CAD/AVL System provides the capability for two-way communication via pre-formatted text messages to Agency vehicles via a radio data channel to a driver display unit on each vehicle - allowing an enormous reduction in voice radio traffic. A majority of the daily communications activities is handled by this system which frees up the voice radio for essential-only communications and allows for increased effectiveness of our communications center

personnel. Vehicle location is presented on a system map which is updated frequently so communications systems controllers, management, and maintenance staff have an up-to-date location of each vehicle in the Agency fleet. All vehicle activity is tracked and stored by the system for reporting and analysis purposes.

The system was purchased from ACS in 2006, and was fully implemented and accepted in August 2009. Xerox Transportation Systems, Inc. subsequently acquired ACS and Conduent Transportation Services, Inc. subsequently split from Xerox. The current 5-year maintenance and support agreement expires on December 31, 2020. Staff has negotiated a two-year extension to this maintenance and support agreement that locks in maintenance and support costs for another two year period while we move to a new CAD/AVL system.

Conduent is the proprietary vendor for this software and is the only firm that can provide maintenance and support for the CAD/AVL System. Staff conducted a price comparison with other users and has found that the price proposed for the Maintenance and Support Agreement is fair and reasonable.

ALTERNATIVES:

Enter into a more costly single year Maintenance Agreement, however savings realized from a multiyear agreement would be lost.

Pierce Transit 2021 State Legislative Priorities

Major Capital & Infrastructure

Connecting Washington – Bus Rapid Transit I

Pierce Transit is in the environmental phase of a 14.4-mile Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system serving Tacoma, Parkland and Spanaway in Pierce County. The project cost is \$170M, with \$95M already invested through local and state grants and partnership, including \$15M from the Connecting Washington revenue package. Pierce Transit seeks to capture the remaining \$75M from our Federal partners. **Pierce Transit respectfully requests the preservation of its remaining \$11.9M in the Connecting WA package to ensure timely project delivery and economic stimulus in the form of federal investment from the Federal Transit Administration’s Small Starts Program.**

Prioritizing Multimodal Projects in Connecting Washington

Pierce Transit supports legislative leadership on examining the current Connecting WA package and **prioritizing projects which are leveraging federal investment as well as projects already underway and which move the greatest number of people in the most cost-efficient way.**

Bus Rapid Transit II – Feasibility Study

Pierce Transit envisions a **future five-line electric Bus Rapid Transit system** to serve the people of Pierce County. Should the state develop a new revenue package calling for project proposals, **Pierce Transit respectfully requests \$10M for the feasibility study and early design** of BRT 2, serving Tacoma, Fircrest, University Place and Lakewood.

Maintenance + Operations Base Improvement Project (MOBI)

Pierce Transit’s base is 34 years old and in need of modernization and retrofitting to accommodate the agency’s top priority of safety, an electric bus fleet to support the future BRT network and update the current vehicle fuel and wash facility. Pierce Transit also recognizes the additional load electrification places on the local power grid and seeks to mitigate that demand through energy storage. To that end, **Pierce Transit supports any legislation, grant or funding opportunities that invest in electrification charging infrastructure, as well as supports the diversification of clean transportation propulsion systems, including Compressed Natural Gas. This project is shovel-ready.**

Equity in Contracting

Monitor and support legislation put forward by the Capital Projects Advisory Review Board (CPARB).

Support of Partner Priorities & Requests

Sustainable + Equitable Funding for Public Transportation

Pierce Transit supports and encourages the state legislature in identifying a new, sustainable, state-wide public transportation funding solution. An effective revenue tool will protect existing sources of public transportation revenue while incorporating new and innovative funding models to ensure the stability and reliability of equitable public transportation across Washington state.

Support Washington State Transportation Association’s legislative priorities.

Support legislation that incentivizes developers to build affordable housing, such as the multifamily housing tax exemption, and funding allocated for public and nonprofit affordable housing, including the Housing Trust Fund.

Pierce Transit Federal Legislative 2021 Agenda

Pacific Avenue/SR 7 BRT Corridor (Capital Investment Grants - Small Starts)

Pierce Transit has entered into the Small Starts Project Development (SSPD) Phase seeking federal assistance in support of the Pacific Avenue/SR7 Corridor Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project through the Capital Investment Grant (CIG) Program.

The Pacific Avenue/SR7 Corridor is a 14-mile segment of Pacific Avenue S/SR 7 between the Commerce Street Transfer Center in Downtown Tacoma and 204th Street E in Spanaway, entirely within Pierce County. It is Pierce Transit's highest ridership corridor 5,950 average weekday boardings and over 18% of total fixed route ridership system wide. There are more than 3,500 weekday boardings along the portion of the Route 1 being considered for BRT. More than 1.7 million passengers were served in 2016, which is nearly 20 percent of Pierce Transit's fixed route ridership. Pierce Transit's Destination 2040 Long Range Plan, Sound Transit's ST3 Plan, and Puget Sound Regional Council's (PSRC) Transportation 2040 Long Range Plan all support this investment in the busiest transit corridor in Pierce County.

The project will: increase transit ridership through enhanced transit service; deliver cost-effective service that provides capacity to meet future demand; promote transportation equity in the corridor by ensuring that transit service is accessible to all populations; improve multi-modal access and connectivity; support a regional vision for the community as documented in land use and transportation plans; enhance safety and security for transit patrons and public health overall; support existing economic activity and be a catalyst for sustainable economic growth and corridor redevelopment; and promote environmental stewardship and sustainability.

The current 31,500 jobs located along the corridor will increase to an estimated 59,000 by 2040. Approximately 11% of the people living along the corridor are dependent on transit for their travel needs. The City of Tacoma and Pierce County have already identified this corridor for higher-density, mixed-use, transit-oriented development and encompasses six federally-designated Opportunity Zones. The project will result in better access to educational, vocational and job opportunities, services, and businesses and commerce in the area.

Pierce Transit has already committed nonfederal resources totaling \$95 million, including \$60 million from Sound Transit 3 and \$15 million in state funding. The agency will seek federal assistance for the Pacific Avenue/SR7 Corridor through the Small Starts Program. We appreciate your continued support for this critical infrastructure project.

BACKGROUND:

This Memorandum of Agreement supports and leverages resources and funding for Beyond the Borders. Beyond the Borders has been in operation since 2003 and was the first coordinated transportation project developed by the Pierce County Coordinated Transportation Coalition (PCCTC). The program serves individuals with special needs including seniors (age 65 +), individuals with disabilities, low income individuals, and youth (ages 12-17). Pierce County Human Services operates this program. Pierce Transit has been a supporting partner since the beginning.

Beyond the Borders provides connections to Pierce Transit services for those who live outside the PTBA and provides access to destinations not served by Pierce Transit. The program provides service in Bonney Lake, Buckley, Carbonado, Eatonville, Frederickson, Graham, Kapowsin, McKenna, Orting, Prairie Ridge, Roy, South Hill, South Prairie, Spanaway, Sumner and Wilkeson.

The system offers both demand response service as well as connector service. Connector service connects South Hill to Spanaway and Sumner to Bonney Lake. The routes deviate up to a mile off route to serve individuals with disabilities or travel limitations that prevent them from getting from their homes to the established stops. These routes run on a 45-minute schedule Monday-Friday. Beyond the Borders also offers demand response service for individuals who require higher levels of assistance for travel or live too far from the routes.

In addition, Beyond the Borders provides a Boundary Expansion service which provides trips to locations up to seven miles inside the PTBA. This allows SHUTTLE-eligible customers living outside the PTBA to travel entirely with Beyond the Borders to their destination, without transferring to SHUTTLE.

In 2019, the Boundary Expansion program provided over 2,400 trips, which was a cost savings of \$129,250.00 to the SHUTTLE program.

Beyond the Borders received a priority ranking of A from the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) for the 2019-2021 biennium which is the highest project ranking available. Beyond the Borders receives \$560,380 annually from FTA 5310 grant funding from the Washington Department of Transportation. Pierce Transit's contribution of \$180,000 yearly provides required local match for these grants. In total, Pierce Transit has contributed the following: 2016: \$150,000; 2017: \$170,000; 2018-20: \$540,000.

Prior to the pandemic, Beyond the Borders averaged 1,500 trips per month. Through the third quarter of 2020, Beyond the Borders has averaged 934 trips per month, and approximately 63% of these trips connect with Pierce Transit services. Beyond the Borders is running at approximately 75% of its normal ridership as the pandemic continues.

During the pandemic, Beyond the Borders continues to provide critical trips to dialysis, employment and other essential destinations for the riders in Pierce County without transportation options. The partnership is even more critical currently when needs are highest.

This request includes a contingency amount of \$20,000 to support cost escalations for services during 2022-23.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

The recommendation is that the Pierce Transit Board authorizes the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute the new Memorandum of Agreement, Between Pierce County and Pierce Transit Supporting Beyond the Borders Special Needs Transportation, in the amount of \$540,000, with an expiration date of 12/31/2023.

ALTERNATIVES:

One alternative may be to not fund this program. This would have a devastating impact on the program and result in Pierce County losing over \$560,000 in yearly grant funds due to lack of local match. The program would most likely not survive.

PROPOSED MOTION:

Move to: Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute a new three-year Memorandum of Agreement Between Pierce County and Pierce Transit Supporting Beyond the Borders Special Needs Transportation in an amount not to exceed \$560,000.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

BETWEEN PIERCE COUNTY AND PIERCE TRANSIT

SUPPORTING BEYOND THE BORDERS SPECIAL NEEDS TRANSPORTATION

This memo of agreement (MOA), made and entered into this 1st day of January, 2021 by and between Pierce County, hereinafter referred to as the “County”, and the Pierce County Public Transportation Benefit Area (PTBA) Corporation, a Municipal Corporation, hereinafter referred to as “Pierce Transit”(PT), formed under authority of Chapter 36.57A of the Revised Code of Washington, sets forth a common agreement concerning, the development, funding and implementation of coordinated transportation projects, including a “Coordinated Transportation Plan for people with special transportation needs in Pierce County”. This MOA provides for a combination of products, & services in a manner and pursuant to forms of government organization that will accord best geographic, economic, population and other factors influencing the needs and development of local communities.

RECITALS

Whereas, Pierce Transit and the County are both active members of the Pierce County Coordinated Transportation Coalition (PCCTC); and

Whereas, the County is the lead agency for developing a Coordinated Transportation Plan for Pierce County in accordance with the Agency Council on Coordinated Transportation (ACCT) guidelines and under the cooperative guidance of the Coalition; and

Whereas, the County has received grant funding that supports coordinated transportation projects; and

Whereas, both jurisdictions support the cooperative development and implementation of coordinated transportation projects to the extent feasible with limited resources, and serving a variety of community transportation service needs; and

Whereas, both parties wish to enter into this MOA, in order to help fund and complete coordinated transportation projects for people with special transportation needs in Pierce County.

Now therefore, in consideration of interagency efficiencies, the County and Pierce Transit hereby agree to work jointly to coordinate grants and funding opportunities that support efforts to develop and implement coordinated transportation projects as specified under this MOA.

OBJECTIVE

The objective of this MOA is to provide funding to support ridership for the Beyond the Borders transportation program from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2023.

COORDINATED TRANSPORTATION BACKGROUND

In October of 2000, the Pierce County Coordinated Transportation Coalition (PCCTC) was formed. The Coalition is a diverse group of citizens, transportation providers, human service agencies, local governments, and advocacy groups that are working together to develop a coordinated transportation plan. The mission of the PCCTC is to plan for and develop coordinated transportation services and programs that will achieve increased efficiencies and will be able to provide enhanced mobility and accessibility to a greater number of Pierce County residents, particularly those with special transportation needs. The County is designated as the lead agency for the PCCTC. As lead agency, the County

manages the administrative process to develop and implement a coordinated transportation plan for Pierce County.

This MOA supports and leverages resources and funding for Beyond the Borders. Beyond the Borders has been in operation since 2003 and was the first coordinated transportation project developed by the PCCTC. Pierce Transit has been a supporting partner since the beginning. Beyond the Borders provides connections to Pierce Transit services for those who live outside the PTBA and provides access to destinations not served by Pierce Transit. The program serves individuals with special needs including youth, individuals with disabilities, low income individuals, and seniors. Along with Pierce Transit's contribution, other funding sources include grants from the Washington State Department of Transportation and the Area Agency on Aging. Beyond the Borders received a priority ranking of A from the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) for the 2019-2021 biennium which is the highest project ranking available. This project is included in the Transit Development Plan, as well as in the local and regional (PSRC) Human Services Transportation Plan.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE COUNTY TO PIERCE TRANSIT

Beyond the Borders shall be managed by Pierce County. The County will be responsible for contracting for services, paying for all goods and services related to the project and fiscal record keeping for Beyond the Borders. The County may request reimbursement for projects defined and agreed to under this MOA. All requests shall include documentation of project costs and/or a copy of all invoices. The County is responsible for documenting and requesting eligible reimbursement under this MOA and submitting requests to Pierce Transit.

ADMINISTRATION

The management of Beyond the Borders shall be under the direction of the County, unless specified otherwise under this MOA. The County has designated Jerri Kelly, Pierce County Human Services, as lead person for this project. Pierce Transit has designated Ausha Potts as Pierce Transit's liaison with the County under this MOA.

FUNDING SOURCES and DISTRIBUTION

Under the terms of this MOA, Pierce Transit will provide up to one hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$180,000.00) yearly toward Beyond the Borders, as long as Pierce Transit's financial conditions permit this contribution and this funding is allocated in Pierce Transit's budget. The County may use up to 10% of these funds for administrative costs to support this project. Pierce Transit's contribution may not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the local project cost, and may be used to match the County's other available resources including any eligible combination of local, Federal, or State funding to be secured by the County, and subject to grant match requirements. The County shall invoice Pierce Transit for final reconciliation of Pierce Transit's contribution no later than December 31, yearly. Final approval and distribution are subject to meeting all grant requirements.

This MOA does not specify the source of funding used by Pierce Transit to complete obligations identified under this MOA.

CONTRACTS FOR BEYOND THE BORDERS

The County shall have authorization to award and manage contracts. This shall include making payments to contractors and any suppliers. The County shall notify Pierce Transit of any changes in contracts that would change scope of work or timeline for completion of projects under this MOA. The County shall coordinate with Pierce Transit to assure consistency with grant requirements and project intent prior to executing a contract for a project identified under this MOA.

INDEMNIFICATION

Each Party to this MOA shall be responsible for its own acts and/or omissions and those of its employees and agents. No party to this MOA shall be responsible for the acts and/or on entities or individuals not a party to this MOA.

TERMINATION

Either Party may terminate this MOA hereto with 60 days advance written notice sufficient to permit the remaining Party to reasonably assume the responsibilities being performed by the terminating Party. Such termination shall not affect or terminate any other MOA between the parties hereto. Any costs incurred prior to proper notification of termination will be borne by the Parties in accordance with the terms of this MOA.

NON-DISCRIMINATION

The parties hereto agree that they shall not participate in any discriminatory action against any employee who is paid by funds indicated in this MOA or against any applicant for such employment because of race, religion, color, sex, marital status, creed, national origin, age, Vietnam era or disabled veterans status, or the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical handicap. This provision shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment, advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training.

MODIFICATIONS TO THIS MOA

The County and Pierce Transit may request changes to this MOA. Any such changes that are mutually agreed upon by the Parties to this MOA shall be incorporated herein by written amendment to this MOA.

DURATION

This MOA shall commence upon January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2023, or until both parties agree that the coordinated transportation project has been completed.

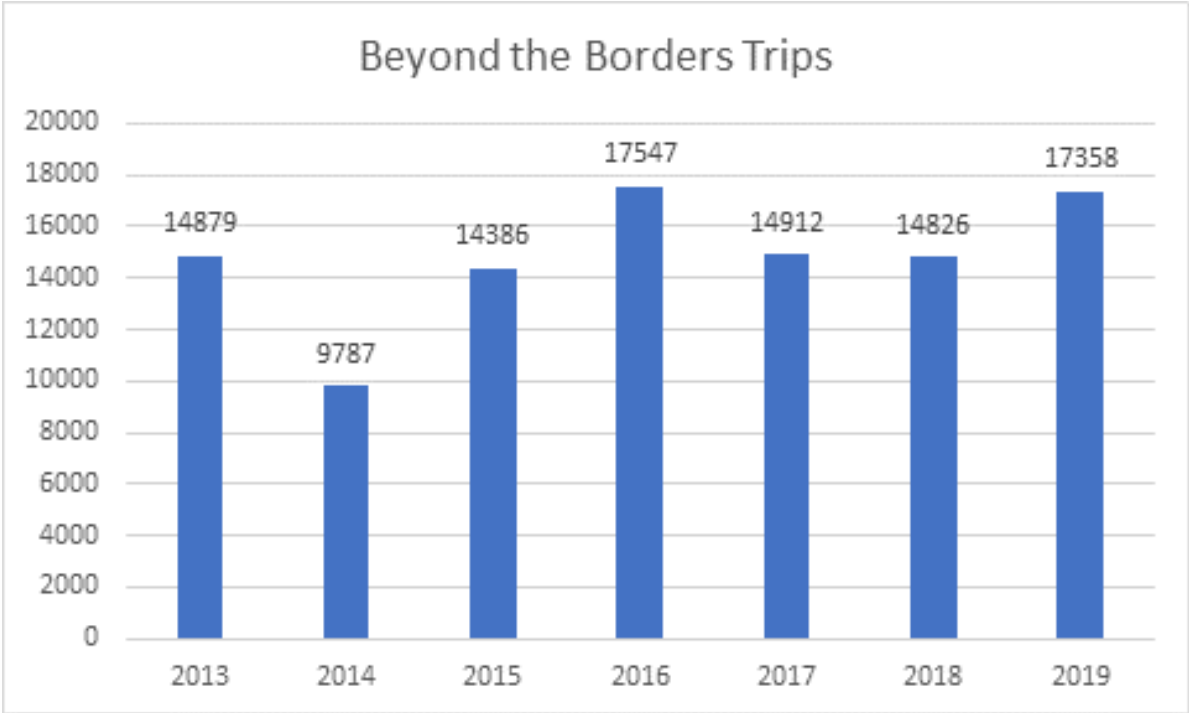

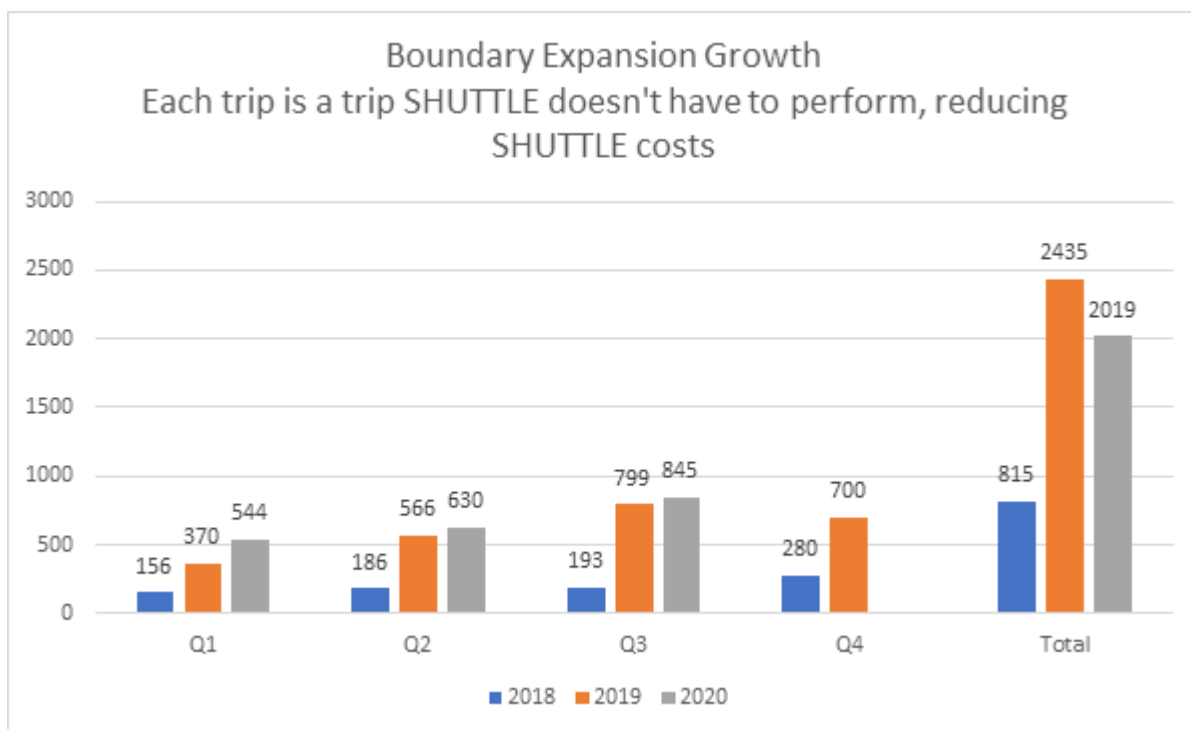
Beyond the Borders service is provided utilizing two Connector bus routes; one route connects Sumner with Bonney Lake, the other goes from South Hill to Spanaway. These routes can also deviate up to a mile to pick up customers by request. Beyond the Borders also offers door to door demand response service for those who don't live near a Connector route. Pierce County Human Services is the lead agency and contracts with ATS/TransPro and Envoy America to provide the service. Pierce Transit provides local funding matched by regional competitive Special Needs Transportation grant awards from the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) and the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT)

Beyond the Borders Boundary Expansion Growth Statistics: 2018-20

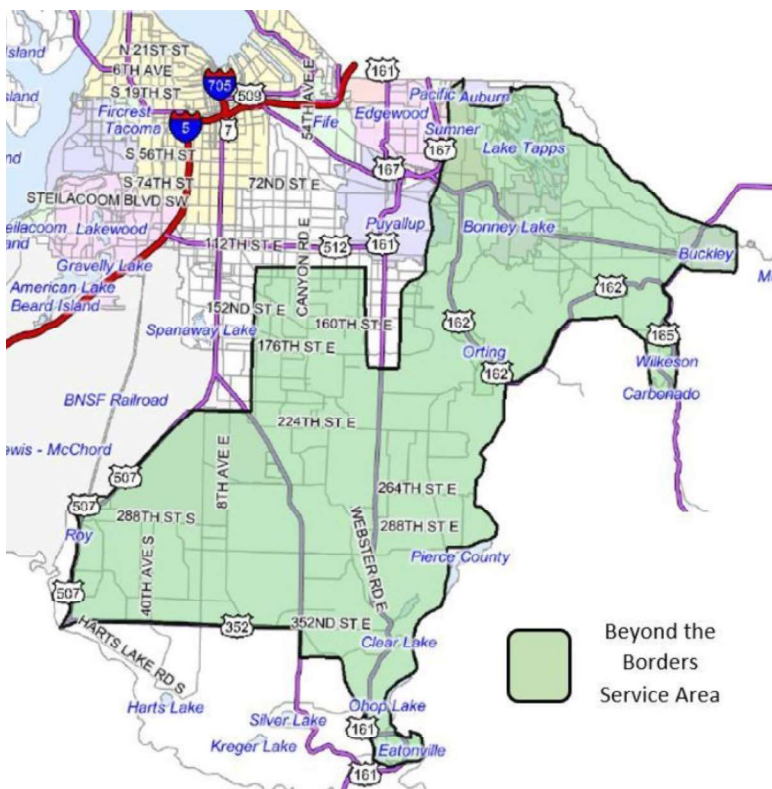

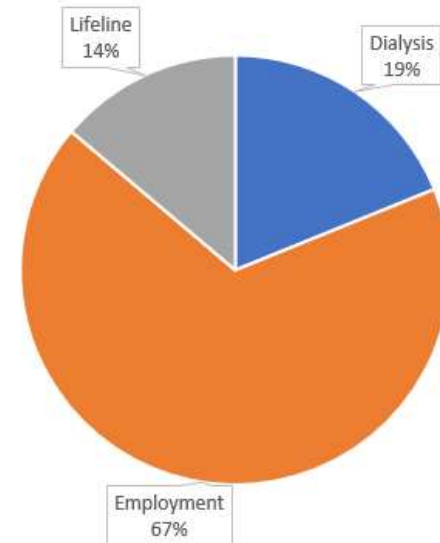

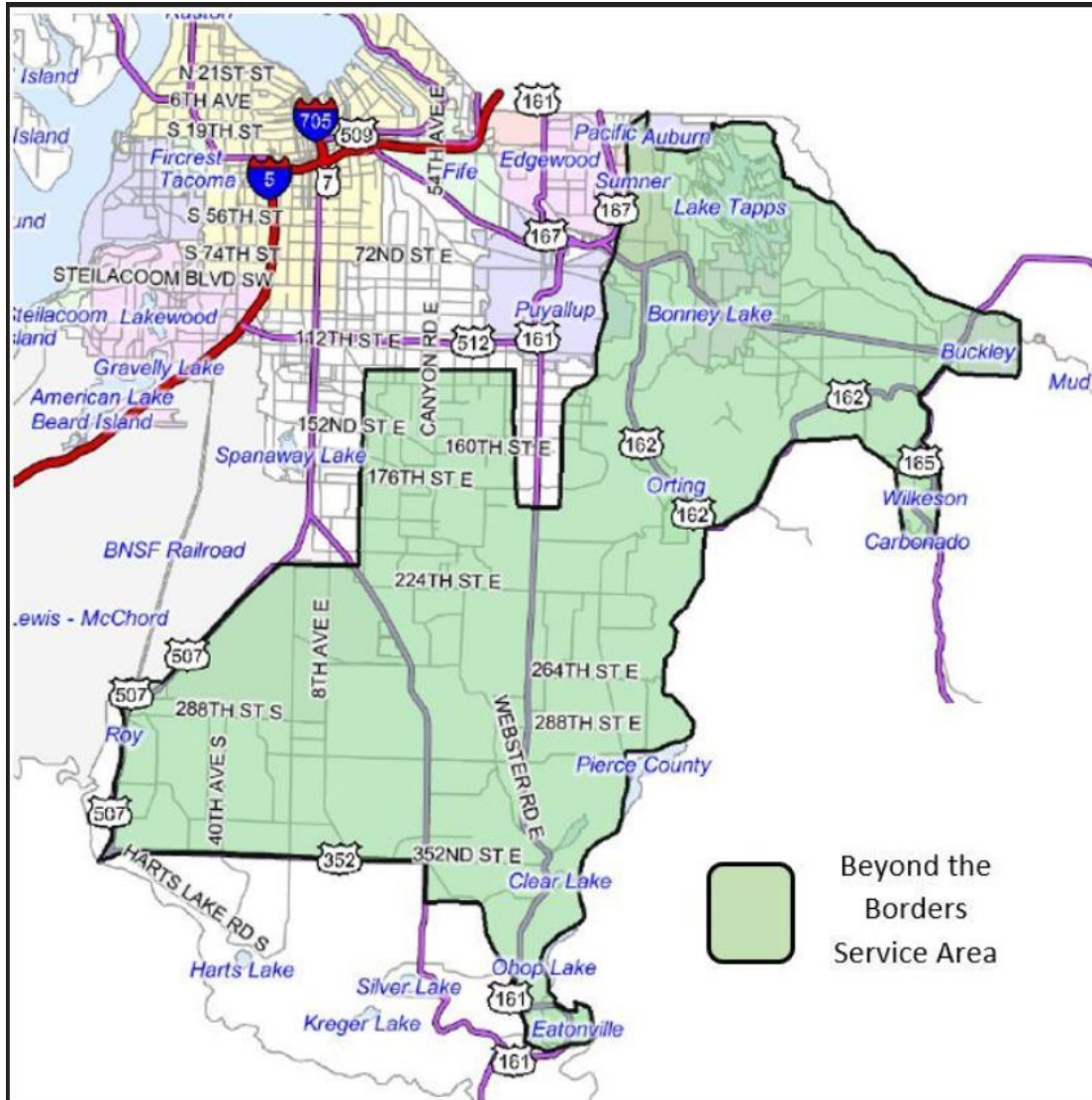

BACKGROUND:

In October of 2019 staff entered into a one-year contract with Technical Security Integration for the physical security and maintenance and alarm monitoring services in the amount of \$142,859.40 and subsequently executed Amendment No. 1 increasing the contract authority amount by \$48,000. Staff then executed Amendment No. 2 extending the contract from September 30, 2020 through September 30, 2021. Pierce Transit is requesting an additional \$145,000 (Amendment No. 3) to fund physical security and maintenance services over the period of this additional contract year.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends authorizing Amendment No. 3 so that physical security system testing and maintenance can be provided through September 30, 2021.

ALTERNATIVES:

Do not authorize Amendment No. 3. This is not recommended as there would be a lapse in service and maintenance to critical day to day security systems across all Pierce Transit locations. Due to the aging of our system we may not be able to meet our security policies and ensure the safety of our employees and assets.

BACKGROUND:

Pierce Transit currently operates 175 coaches powered by compressed natural gas (CNG). For the past twenty-five years, Pierce Transit has taken advantage of our high usage and has purchased natural gas from independent brokers instead of Puget Sound Energy (PSE). Our current contract with CMS expires on November 30, 2020. A request for proposals was issued on September 16, 2020.

Two proposals were received on September 28th, 2020, from Cost Management Services, LLC, and United Energy Trading, LLC. The specifications asked proposers to provide pricing per year and to describe the services to be provided. Pierce Transit staff have evaluated the proposals according to published RFP criteria. As a result, we found that the proposal from United Energy Trading, LLC, is the low bid, meets Pierce Transit's needs for these services, offers competitive fees and allows for maximum usage flexibility.

Annual pricing was requested for proposal evaluation purposes only. The price of gas will likely fluctuate throughout the contract term. Staff will lock into fixed pricing for a term of three years that provides the flexibility of using the index pricing plus pipeline charges and allows for adjustments as market conditions become more favorable. Broker's fee and taxes are not to exceed \$8,100,000.00 over the course of the contract (estimated at \$0.45 per therm, 3 million annual therms, for 6 years). The contract will be for a period of up to six (6) years.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute Contract #1084 to United Energy Trading, LLC, to supply compressed natural gas for up to a period of six years and an authorized total not to exceed \$8,100,000, acknowledging that costs will fluctuate based on annual usage and price fluctuations.

ALTERNATIVES:

The alternative would be not to sign a contract for natural gas with a broker and purchase gas through PSE, however this option could result in higher costs to the agency and/or a less favorable level of service than we currently have with a CNG Broker.

Estimated annual savings of \$1,014,543 in CCN costs and related fees. More accurate cost analysis will be available after Q3 of 2021.

BACKGROUND:

The Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners approved Resolution No. 2014-058 on November 10, 2014, authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute an interlocal agreement with Pierce County for the Creation, Operation, Sustainment and Governance of a Combined Communication Network System. For purposes of this document, this agreement will be referenced as the "CCN Governing Agreement".

As a result of the CCN Governing Agreement, the Combined Communication Network (CCN) Enterprise was established in January 2015 along with the creation of the CCN Executive Board to serve as the governing body and policy-making body to oversee the activities, operations and maintenance of the CCN, a joint venture partnership between Pierce Transit and Pierce County.

Pierce Transit is currently in the process of implementing a newer, advanced Computer-Aided Dispatch/Automatic Vehicle Location (CAD/AVL) technology to serve the Pierce Transit system. It is anticipated that the new CAD/AVL system will be implemented by July 2023, and, as such, this technology would replace the majority of the radio/communication service that is currently being provided by the CCN.

Due to the complexity of the CCN Governing Agreement that sets forth shared assets /shared equipment, shared responsibilities and FCC licensing authorizations between Pierce Transit and Pierce County, Pierce Transit is requesting authority to provide advanced notice to the CCN Executive Board of its intent to withdraw from the CCN partnership.

In collaboration with Pierce County personnel, Pierce Transit will provide a detailed withdrawal plan along with asset distribution information to the Pierce Transit Board and the CCN Executive Board no later than Quarter 3 of 2021.

Pierce Transit intends to remain a partner of the CCN Enterprise at least through December 2021. Once the asset value is agreed to by Pierce Transit and Pierce County, Pierce Transit will become a subscriber of the CCN. Pierce Transit asset value will be applied to future subscriber costs until the asset value is expended and the transference of the assets to Pierce County has been completed. Tentative goal for this to occur is December 31, 2021, but no later than July 30, 2022.

Pierce Transit's CAD/AVL and radio system is projected to be completed by on or before July 2023. At which time it is completed, Pierce Transit will continue to subscribe to a public safety radio system at a reduced number for our Public Safety Officers and Emergency Management personnel.

Because of the complexity of the shared assets/shared responsibilities, FCC licensing agreements, and the need for Pierce Transit's CAD/AVL system to be fully implemented before Pierce Transit can independently provide for the majority its own radio/communication services, Pierce Transit cannot provide at this time a specific date as to when it will exit from the CCN partnership. The specific exit date will be provided in the withdrawal plan that will be presented and approved by the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners in Q3 of 2021.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends providing the Combined Communications Network Enterprise Executive Board with the notice of intent to withdraw from this partnership as required by the CCN's governing agreement.

ALTERNATIVES:

Continue the CCN partnership. Remaining a CCN Partner would unnecessarily increase costs for radio and communication services and would duplicate voice and data requirements that will be provided by the Computer Aided Dispatch / Automated Vehicle Location solution technology scheduled to be implemented by December 2022.

PROPOSED MOTION:

Move to: Approve Resolution No. 2020-021, authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to 1) provide advance notice to the CCN Executive Board on or before November 30, 2020 of Pierce Transit's intent to withdraw from the Joint Partnership with Pierce County to Jointly Own, Maintain, Operate and Govern a Shared Single County Wide Communication System for the Pierce Transit System and the County's Public Safety Programs; and 2) Direct staff to work in collaboration with Pierce County personnel to develop and provide to the CCN Executive Board and Pierce Transit Board by end of Quarter 3 of 2021 an exit plan and assessment and cost analysis of the shared assets as defined in Section 14 of the "CCN Governing Agreement."

10 WHEREAS, As a result of said interlocal agreement, the Combined Communication Network (CCN)

BACKGROUND:

On August 8, 2011, the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit approved Resolution No. 2011-020 adopting a Transit Advertising Policy governing advertisements appearing on Pierce Transit vehicles and facilities. This Policy was last revised in July 2013 (approved by Resolution No. 2013-017) to, among other things, include Pierce Transit's publications.

The current Transit Advertising Policy provides standards and criteria to be applied to all advertisements appearing on Pierce Transit's vehicles, facilities, and publications. Pierce Transit's revenues from advertising sales contribute to the agency's operating funds. Currently, the Transit Advertising Policy allows Public Service Announcements, but prohibits Political and Public Issue advertising, all as defined under the Policy. Distinguishing between advertisements that qualify as permitted or prohibited under the Policy has sometimes proven challenging for Pierce Transit and/or its Transit Advertising Contractor. Accordingly, Pierce Transit is considering revising its Transit Advertising Policy to allow only Commercial Advertising, Pierce Transit Advertising, and Governmental Advertising, all as defined under the Policy. Additionally, given that seven years have passed since the last revisions to the Transit Advertising Policy, some provisions of the Policy may need updating and/or clarification.

Initially, the proposed revisions to the "Purpose" section of the Policy clarify that Pierce Transit's mission is to provide transportation services and to maintain and provide Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications that are safe, comfortable, convenient, and retain and attract new users of its public transportation services. The revisions further clarify that Pierce Transit maintains its advertising space as a nonpublic forum subject to the restrictions in the Transit Advertising Policy. While the primary purpose of the Policy is to provide an additional source of revenue, the revisions clarify that a secondary purpose is to provide a mechanism for Pierce Transit to communicate with the public regarding Pierce Transit's and its partners' services and programs and for other Government Entities to communicate with the public. The revisions also clarify that Pierce Transit's acceptance of an advertisement does not constitute express or implied endorsement of the content or message of the advertisement or its sponsor. Additionally, Pierce Transit may suspend, modify, or revoke the Policy or portions of it as necessary to comply with legal mandates or recommendations, to accommodate Pierce Transit's primary transportation function, or upon the directive of the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners.

The proposed revisions to the "Definitions" section update the definitions to include all types of facilities and vehicles owned and maintained by Pierce Transit and to include Pierce Transit's online and social media presence. Additionally, the revision to the definition of "Transit Advertising Contractor" eliminates a reference to a vendor not currently used by Pierce Transit.

The proposed revisions to the "Permitted Advertising Content" section of the Policy clarify the scope of Commercial Advertising permitted under the Policy to be limited to commercial transactions and not to include promotional advertising generally. The revisions add a category for Pierce Transit Advertising that promotes Pierce Transit's own services and programs, as well as services and programs undertaking partnership with other entities. The revisions also clarify the scope of permitted Governmental Advertising as limited to advertising that promotes government services or programs, community events, awareness of issues of importance to the community served by the Government Entity, or more generally promotes the Government Entity or community served by the Government Entity. The Policy eliminates the category of Public Service Announcements, which would no longer be permitted under the Policy.

The proposed revisions to the "Prohibited Advertising Content" section of the Policy clarify that prohibited advertising content consists of content that does not qualify as Commercial Advertising, Pierce Transit Advertising, or Governmental Advertising under the Policy. In addition to the pre-existing prohibitions on Political and Public Issue advertising, the revisions prohibit Religious advertising that addresses, promotes, or opposes any identifiable or specific religion or religious viewpoint, message, or practice. The revisions also add a category prohibiting advertising (other than the permitted Pierce Transit Advertising) that discusses, refers to, depicts or portrays Pierce Transit or its programs or services, its partner the Central Puget Sound Regional Transit Authority, or either agency's officers or employees. The revisions also eliminate previous categories that prohibited Insulting, Degrading or Offensive or Disparaging material and Government Comments on Issues of Public Debate, which is now addressed in the definition of Governmental Advertising. The revisions further update existing categories of prohibited advertising to add public safety issues to the Public Issue category, electronic nicotine delivery systems to the Tobacco/Nicotine category, and Cannabis Products to the Alcohol category. The descriptions of certain Adult/Mature content, Adult Entertainment Facilities, and Sexual and/or Excretory Subject Matter also are updated or clarified. Finally, the revisions clarify the definitions of False or Misleading advertising, Profanity or Violence, advertising that is Harmful or Disruptive to the Transit System, and advertising that encourages or depicts Unsafe or Unlawful Conduct.

Finally, the proposed revisions streamline the "Procedures" for review and approval of proposed advertisements. The procedure for reviewing an advertiser's 501(c)(3) status, which was relevant to Public Service Announcements, is eliminated. The revisions further clarify that an advertisement must meet the definition of Permitted Advertising Content to be allowed under the Policy. Finally, the revisions clarify the titles of individuals who make or review advertising decisions under the Policy.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board adopt the proposed Transit Advertising Policy in substantially the same form as Exhibit A.

ALTERNATIVES:

Take no action and continue reviewing advertisements under the current Transit Advertising Policy. Another alternative would be to consider additional revisions to this proposed Transit Advertising Policy before adoption.

PROPOSED MOTION:

I. PURPOSE

Pierce Transit provides safe, reliable, innovative and useful public transportation services that are locally based and regionally connected. Pierce Transit operates Pierce County's public transportation system. Pierce Transit's mission is to be your transportation choice for today and tomorrow. Consistent with this purpose and mission, Pierce Transit seeks to maintain and provide Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications that are safe, comfortable, convenient, and retain and attract new users of its public transportation services. Pierce Transit's operations are funded by a combination of federal, state and local funds, including grants and taxes, as well as fare box revenue. Advertising revenues ~~are an important~~ provide an additional source of revenue that supports Pierce Transit's operations. In order to raise additional revenue, Pierce Transit will accept advertising on its Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications only if such advertising complies with the guidelines set forth in this Advertising Policy.

By allowing limited types of advertising on or within Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications, ~~and in keeping with its proprietary function as a provider of public transportation,~~ Pierce Transit does not ~~intend to provide or~~ create a public forum for public discourse or expressive activity, or ~~to~~ provide a forum for all types of advertisements. ~~Rather, Pierce Transit maintains its advertising space as a nonpublic forum subject to the restrictions in this Policy.~~ Pierce Transit's purpose in accepting transit advertising is to generate additional revenue to augment Pierce Transit's operating budget. ~~Additionally, a secondary purpose of this Advertising Policy is to provide a mechanism for Pierce Transit to communicate with the public regarding Pierce Transit's and its partners' services and programs and for other Government Entities to communicate with the public regarding governmental services or programs, community events, or issues of importance to the community. In allowing for certain advertising by Pierce Transit and other Government Entities, Pierce Transit intends to provide a public benefit by providing an efficient and effective mechanism for Pierce Transit and other Government Entities to communicate with the transit-using public. Pursuant to this Advertising Policy, Pierce Transit retains strict control over the types of advertisements accepted in its Transit Facilities, Transit Vehicles, or Transit Publications.~~

Pierce Transit's acceptance of an advertisement does not constitute express or implied endorsement of the content or message of the advertisement, including any person, organization, products, services, information or viewpoints contained therein, or of the ~~advertisement sponsor~~ itself.

This Policy may be suspended, modified or revoked as necessary to comply with legal mandates or recommendations, to accommodate Pierce Transit's primary transportation function, or upon the directive of the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners. Any provision in this Policy shall be deemed severable.

II. APPLICATION OF ADVERTISING POLICY

Except as otherwise provided herein, ~~T~~his Advertising Policy applies to the posting of all new advertisements on Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications on or after the effective date of this Transit Advertising ~~p~~Policy. Any advertisements ~~which that~~ would be

prohibited under this Advertising Policy, but ~~which~~ were posted ~~in 2011~~ pursuant to the terms of any previous Transit Advertising Policy and a duly executed advertising contract prior to the ~~E~~effective Date of this Advertising Policy, will be allowed to remain posted for the duration of that contract.

III. DEFINITIONS

“Transit Facilities” means transit oriented facilities that are owned or operated by Pierce Transit including, but not limited to, buildings, bus stops, bus shelters, stations, and park-and-ride facilities.

“Transit Vehicles” means all passenger vehicles that are owned or operated by Pierce Transit for use by the general public or by registered SHUTTLE passengers.

“Transit Publications” means literature or information produced by Pierce Transit including, but not limited to, ~~The Bus Stops Here~~ Routes and Schedules books, brochures, piercetransit.org, and any Pierce Transit-administered social media.

“Government Entity” means any public entity specifically created by government action.

“Transit Advertising Contractor” means ~~Titan Outdoor, LLC, or any other entity~~ the vendor(s) that Pierce Transit contracts with regarding the placements or sale of advertising on Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities and Transit Publications.

IV. POLICIES

A. PERMITTED ADVERTISING CONTENT

The following classes of advertising are authorized ~~on~~ Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications if the advertisement does not include any material that qualifies as Prohibited Advertising under ~~Subsection 8~~ Section IV.B of this Advertising Policy:

1. ~~Commercial and Promotional~~ Advertising. Commercial and Promotional Advertising that primarily promotes the sale, lease, rental, distribution or availability of goods, services, food, entertainment, events, programs, transactions, donations, products or property (real or personal) for commercial or noncommercial purposes or more generally promotes an entity that engages in such activities. It is Pierce Transit's intent that Commercial Advertising will not be used for comment on a Public Issue, as further defined in Section IV.B(2), and will not include any material that qualifies as Prohibited Advertising under Section IV.B of this Advertising Policy.
2. Pierce Transit Advertising. Advertising that promotes Pierce Transit's own services and programs, as well as services and programs undertaken in partnership with other entities. Subject to the terms and limitations of any agreement Pierce Transit may have with a Transit Advertising Contractor, Pierce Transit may offer free or reduced cost advertising on Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and in Transit Publications of services and programs that Pierce Transit determines, in its sole discretion, further or promote the provision of Pierce Transit's

transportation services or programs to the public. Pierce Transit also may, in its sole discretion, enter into one or more sponsorship agreements for its services and programs. A sponsorship agreement is distinct from advertising in that a sponsorship typically does not solicit a specific transaction, but instead associates a brand with Pierce Transit through a long-term non-transactional arrangement. Any such sponsorship agreements entered into by Pierce Transit shall not be subject to this Advertising Policy except to the extent this Advertising Policy is incorporated into the sponsorship agreement.

2.3. Governmental Advertising. Advertising by a Government Entity may purchase advertising for messages that advance specific government services or programs, community events, awareness of issues of importance to the community served by the Government Entity such as public health issues, or more generally promotes the Government Entity or community served by the Government Entity. It is Pierce Transit's intent that governmental advertising will not be used for comment on issues of a Public Issue, as further defined in Section IV.B(2) debate, and will not include any material that qualifies as Prohibited Advertising under Section IV.B of this Advertising Policy.

~~3. Public Service Announcements. Pierce Transit recognizes that its advertising program and its overall public transportation mission are promoted by allowing Public Service Announcements. First, such announcements engender goodwill with the public because the transit system is seen as a caring and active participant in the community it serves. Second, board members and administrators of nonprofit and government organizations who purchase space for Public Service Announcements are introduced to the benefits of transit advertising, increasing the likelihood they will continue to purchase transit advertising in the future for their organizations or other organizations in which they are involved.~~

~~4. Public Service Announcements. PA Public Service Announcement must satisfy the following criteria:~~

~~(a) The sponsor of the Public Service Announcement must be a government entity or a nonprofit corporation that is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. At the time of submission of a proposed advertisement, the sponsor shall submit documentation of its 501(c)(3) status to the Transit Advertising Contractor.~~

~~(b) The Public Service Announcement may not include a message that is primarily commercial or retail in nature or related to a festival, show, sporting event, concert, lecture or event for which an admission is charged.~~

~~(c) The Public Service Announcement must be directed to the general public or a significant segment of the public and relate to:~~

- ~~(i) — Prevention or treatment of illnesses;~~
- ~~(ii) — Promotion of safety or personal well-being;~~
- ~~(iii) — Provision of children or family services;~~
- ~~(iv) — Solicitation by broad-based employee contribution campaigns which provide funds to multiple charitable organizations; or~~
- ~~(v) — Provisions of services and programs that provide support to low income citizens and citizens with disabilities.~~

B. PROHIBITED ADVERTISING CONTENT

Advertising is prohibited on Transit Vehicles, Transit Facilities, and Transit Publications if it does not qualify as Commercial Advertising, Pierce Transit Advertising, or Governmental Advertising as defined in Section IV.A above or if it includes any of the following content, or includes an internet address or telephone number that directly relates~~links~~ to any of the following content:

1. Political. Advertising promoting or opposing a political party; ~~or~~ promoting or opposing the election of any candidate or group of candidates for federal, state or local office; or Advertising promoting or opposing existing or proposed laws, initiatives, referendums or other ballot measures.
2. Public Issue. Advertising expressing or advocating an opinion, position or viewpoint on matters of public debate about economic, political, public safety, religious or social issues.
3. Religious. Advertising that addresses, promotes or opposes any identifiable or specific religion or religious viewpoint, message or practice, including but not limited to the lack of religious beliefs.
- 3.4. Prohibited Products, Services or Activities. Any advertising that (i) promotes the sale, rental, or use of, or participation in, the following products, services or activities; or (ii) that uses brand names, trademarks, slogans or other material that are identifiable with such products, services or activities:
 - (a) Tobacco/Nicotine. Tobacco or nicotine products, including but not limited to, cigarettes, electronic nicotine delivery systems, cigars and smokeless tobacco;
 - (b) Alcohol and Cannabis Products. Beer, wine, distilled spirits or any alcoholic beverage licensed and regulated under Washington law, and cannabis or any cannabis product licensed and regulated under Washington law~~however~~ or federal law, including but not limited to any substance deemed a Schedule I controlled substance under the Controlled Substances Act, Title 21 U.S.C.,

provided that this prohibition shall not prohibit advertising that includes the name of a restaurant;

- (c) Adult/Mature Rated Films, Television or Video Games. Adult films rated "X" or "NC-17", or equivalent; television rated "MIX-TV-MA" or equivalent; or video games rated "IX" "AO (Adults Only)", or "M" or equivalent;
- (d) Adult Entertainment Facilities, Services, and Products. ~~Adult book s~~Stores selling adult books and other products, adult video stores, adult telephone services, adult internet sites, escort services, nude dance clubs and other adult entertainment establishments.

4.5. Illegal Activity. Any advertising that promotes an activity or product that is illegal under federal, state or local law.

5.6. Sexual and/or Excretory Subject Matter. Any advertising that contains or involves any material that describes, depicts or represents sexual or excretory organs or activities in a way:

- (i) Which the average adult person, applying contemporary community standards, would find, when considered as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest ~~of minors in sex~~; and
- (ii) ~~w~~Which is patently offensive to contemporary community standards ~~in the adult community as a whole with respect to what is suitable material for minors to see~~; and
- (iii) Which, when considered as a whole ~~in the context in which it is used~~, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, ~~medical, health~~ or scientific value; or
- (iv) Which depicts, or reasonably appears to depict, a person under the age of eighteen (18) exhibiting his or her sexual or excretory organs or engaging in sexual or excretory activities.

For purposes of this subsection, "sexual or excretory organs" shall mean and include the male or female pubic area, anus, buttocks, genitalia, or any portion of the areola or nipple of the female breast and "sexual or excretory activities" shall mean and include actual or simulated sex acts of every nature (including but not limited to touching of one's own or another's clothed or unclothed sexual or excretory organs), urination and defecation.

7. False or Misleading. Any material Pierce Transit knows, or the party submitting the advertisement knows or reasonably should have known, is false, fraudulent, misleading, deceptive or would ~~constitute a tort of defamation or invasion of privacy~~ expose Pierce Transit to potential litigation.

8. Copyright, Trademark or Otherwise Unlawful. _Advertising that contains any material that is an infringement of copyright, trademark or service mark, or is otherwise unlawful or illegal.
9. Profanity or Violence. _Advertising that contains any profane language or employs the use of miscellaneous characters or symbols as a substitute for profane language, or portrays images or descriptions of graphic violence, including dead, mutilated or disfigured human beings or animals, the act of killing, mutilating or disfiguring human beings or animals, or intentional infliction of pain or violent action towards or upon a person or animal.
10. Firearms. _Advertising that promotes or solicits the sale, rental, distribution or availability of firearms or firearms-related products or depicts the use of a firearm.
11. Harmful or Disruptive to Transit System. Any material that is so objectionable under contemporary community standards as to be reasonably foreseeable that it will may result in harm to, disruption of, or interference with the operation or business reputation of the transportation system; or that will incite or produce imminent lawless action in the form of retaliation, vandalism or other breach of public safety, peace and order.
- ~~6. — Insulting, Degrading or Offensive. Any material directed at a person or group that is so insulting, degrading or offensive as to be reasonably foreseeable that it will incite or produce imminent lawless action in the form of retaliation, vandalism or other breach of public safety, peace and order.~~
- ~~7. — Disparaging. Any advertising that is intended to be (or reasonably could be interpreted as being) disparaging, disreputable, or disrespectful to organizations, including Pierce Transit, persons, groups, or businesses, including advertising that portrays individuals as inferior, evil or contemptible because of their race, color, creed, sex, pregnancy, age, religion, ancestry, national origin, marital status, disability, sexual orientation or any other characteristic protected under federal, state or local law.~~
12. Lights, Noise and Special Effects. _Flashing lights, sound makers, mirrors or other special effects that interfere with the safe operation of the Transit Vehicles or the safety of Transit Vehicle riders, drivers of other vehicles or the public at large.
13. Unsafe or Unlawful Transit BehaviorConduct. _Any advertisement that encourages or depicts unsafe or unlawful behavior-conduct with respect to transit-related activities, such as non-use of normal safety precautions in awaiting, boarding, riding upon or debarking from transit vehicles or any violation of RCW 9.91.025.

- ~~14. Government Comments on Issues of Public Debate. Advertising from a governmental entity that takes a position on an issue of public debate.~~
14. Endorsement. Advertising that implies or declares an endorsement ~~of~~by Pierce Transit, or the jurisdictions within its service area, of any service, product, or point of view, without written authorization from Pierce Transit or the member jurisdiction.
15. Advertising Regarding Pierce Transit or its Regional Transit Authority Partner. Any advertising, other than the Pierce Transit Advertising permitted under Section IV.A(2), supra, which discusses, refers to, depicts, or portrays Pierce Transit or its programs or services, its partner the Central Puget Sound Regional Transit Authority, or either agency's officers or employees.

V. Additional Requirements

Any advertising in which the identity of the ~~sponsor~~advertiser is not readily and unambiguously identifiable must include the following phrase to identify the ~~sponsor~~advertiser in clearly visible letters (no smaller than 72 point type for exteriors and 24 point type for interiors):

“Advertisement paid for by [name of ~~sponsor~~advertiser].”

VI. PROCEDURES

Pierce Transit, shall from time to time, select a Transit Advertising Contractor who shall be responsible for the daily sales and administration of Pierce Transit’s advertising program, in a manner that is consistent with this Transit Advertising Policy. Pierce Transit shall designate an employee (e.g., Marketing ~~Supervisor~~Assistant Manager) as its “Advertising Administrator” to be the primary contact for the Transit Advertising Contractor. Questions regarding the terms, provisions and requirements of this Transit Advertising Policy shall be addressed initially to the Advertising Administrator.

- A. Submission of Advertising. All proposed advertising must first be submitted by the ~~sponsor~~advertiser to the Transit Advertising Contractor for initial compliance review. The Transit Advertising Contractor shall be responsible for performing a thorough evaluation of the submission to assess its compliance with this Transit Advertising Policy. ~~If the advertisement's sponsor purports to be a 501 (c)(3) organization submitting a Public Service Announcement, it shall provide to the Transit Advertising Contractor documentation demonstrating its 501 (c)(3) status.~~

The Transit Advertising Contractor may at any time discuss with the entity proposing the advertisement one or more revisions to an advertisement, which, if undertaken, would bring the advertisement into conformity with this Transit Advertising Policy.

If the Transit Advertising Contractor is unable to make a compliance determination, the Transit Advertising Contractor shall promptly send the final version of the advertisement, along with the names of the ~~sponsor~~advertiser, the size and number of the advertisements, and the approximate dates and locations of the display, ~~and, to the extent applicable, documentation demonstrating the~~

~~sponsor's 501 (c)(3) status,~~ to the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, for further review.

- B. Authority of Pierce Transit. The ultimate authority to determine whether a particular advertisement complies with this Transit Advertising Policy rests with Pierce Transit.

In the event the Transit Advertising Contractor in contravention of this Transit Advertising Policy approves an advertisement that Pierce Transit ultimately determines is not in compliance with this ~~P~~policy, the Transit Advertising Contractor shall, upon request from Pierce Transit, remove the advertisement within twenty-four (24) hours. In the event Pierce Transit directs the removal of any such advertisement, it shall provide the Transit Advertising Contractor with written notification in compliance with VI.C(1) below; the Transit Advertising Contractor, in turn, shall forward that written notification to the ~~sponsor~~advertiser, and provide the ~~sponsor~~advertiser with the opportunity to revise the advertisement and/or ~~an to~~ appeal ~~of that~~the decision in compliance with Sections VI.C(2) and/or (3) below.

- C. Determination of Compliance. The Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, shall determine whether a particular advertisement submitted by the Transit Advertising Contractor complies with this Transit Advertising Policy. In reaching this determination, the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, may consider any materials submitted by the ~~sponsor~~advertiser, and/or any materials publicly available, and may consult with the Transit Advertising Contractor.

If the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, determines that the advertisement qualifies as one of the categories of permitted advertisements in Section IV.A above and does not fall within any of the categories of prohibited advertisements set forth in Section IV.B above, the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, shall advise the Transit Advertising Contractor that the advertisement is in compliance with this Transit Advertising Policy. The Transit Advertising Contractor shall notify the ~~sponsor~~advertiser of the same.

In the event the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, determines that an advertisement does not qualify as one of the categories of permitted advertisements in Section IV.A above, or that the advertisement qualifies as a permitted advertisement under Section IV.A but falls within one or more of the prohibited categories set forth in Section IV.B above, ~~he/she may seek additional policy review by consulting with his/her direct supervisor or other senior executives up to and including Pierce Transit's Chief Executive Officer. If Pierce Transit determines the advertisement is not in compliance with this policy, then~~ the Advertising Administrator shall proceed as follows:

- (1) Notification of Non-Compliance. The Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee shall provide the Transit Advertising Contractor with a written explanation for the decision within ten (10) days after the decision of non-compliance has been made, and instruct the Transit Advertising Contractor to provide the ~~sponsor~~advertiser with a copy of the Transit Advertising Policy and the written explanation for the decision.

- (2) Opportunity for Revision by ~~Sponsor~~Advertiser. Upon receipt of a decision of non-compliance, the ~~sponsor~~advertiser may provide proposed revisions to the advertisement to the Transit Advertising Contractor. The Transit Advertising Contractor shall promptly provide the revisions to the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, in an effort to bring the advertisement into compliance with the Transit Advertising Policy. If the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee, ~~his/her direct supervisor or other senior executives up to or including Pierce Transit's Chief Executive Officer~~, determines the proposed revisions do not bring the advertisement into compliance with the Transit Advertising Policy, the Advertising Administrator shall provide a written explanation for the decision within ten (10) days after the proposed revision is not accepted to the Transit Advertising Contractor, who shall immediately forward the written explanation to the ~~sponsor~~advertiser.
- (3) Appeal of Decision. Upon receipt of any decision under Section VI.C(1) and/or (2), ~~an sponsor~~advertiser may request review of the Advertising Administrator's decision by the Pierce Transit ~~Chief Administration Officer~~Executive Director of Planning and Community Development ~~and/or the direct supervisor~~ who supervises the Advertising Administrator, or his/her designee.

Upon appeal, the Pierce Transit ~~Chief Administration Officer~~Executive Director of Planning and Community Development and/or the direct supervisor who supervises the Advertising Administrator, or his or her designee, shall provide a written explanation for his/her review decision within ten (10) days of a request for review to the Transit Advertising Contractor, who shall immediately forward the written explanation to the ~~sponsor~~advertiser. This determination shall be deemed final.

VII. Responsibilities

Pierce Transit is responsible for the implementation of this Transit Advertising Policy.
