This project was carried over from 2021, as no vehicles were available for ordering due to COVID-19.

BACKGROUND:

The 2022 capital budget includes funds to replace existing vehicles that meet the replacement parameters and are beyond their useful life. Staff has reviewed the replacement schedule and found that twelve (12) Vanpool vans in the Agency's fleet are eligible for replacement (replacement policy: eight (8) years or 120,000 miles).

The State of Washington has established vehicle contracts that allow for use by political subdivisions. Maintenance staff has reviewed the contracts available and has identified the vehicles appropriate for the intended purpose. State contract pricing is obtained on a competitive bid basis and is considered fair and reasonable. Replacing the vehicles will help mitigate major component failures, downtime, and unplanned maintenance cost. Potential vendors include Bud Clary Dodge, Bud Clary Chevy and Dwayne Lane's Chrysler Jeep Dodge.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

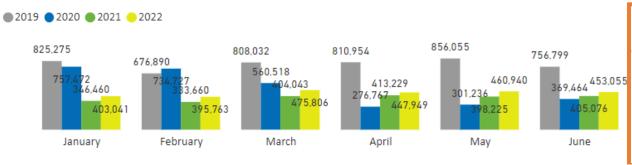

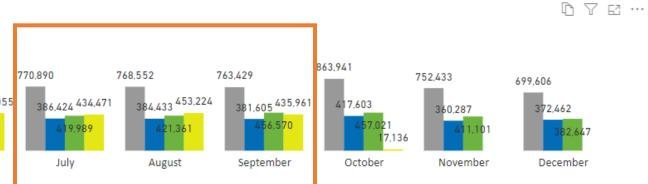

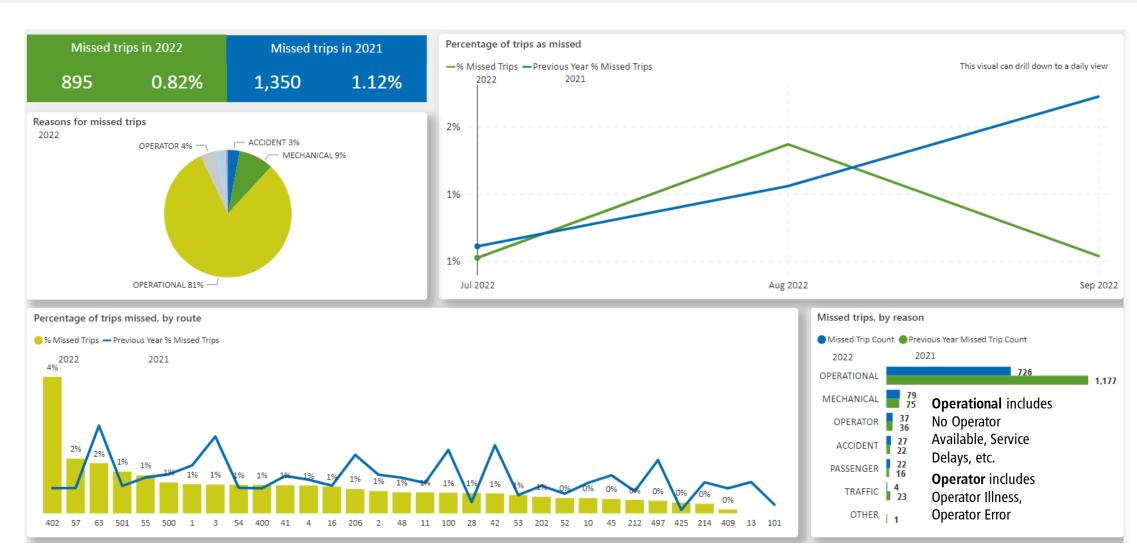

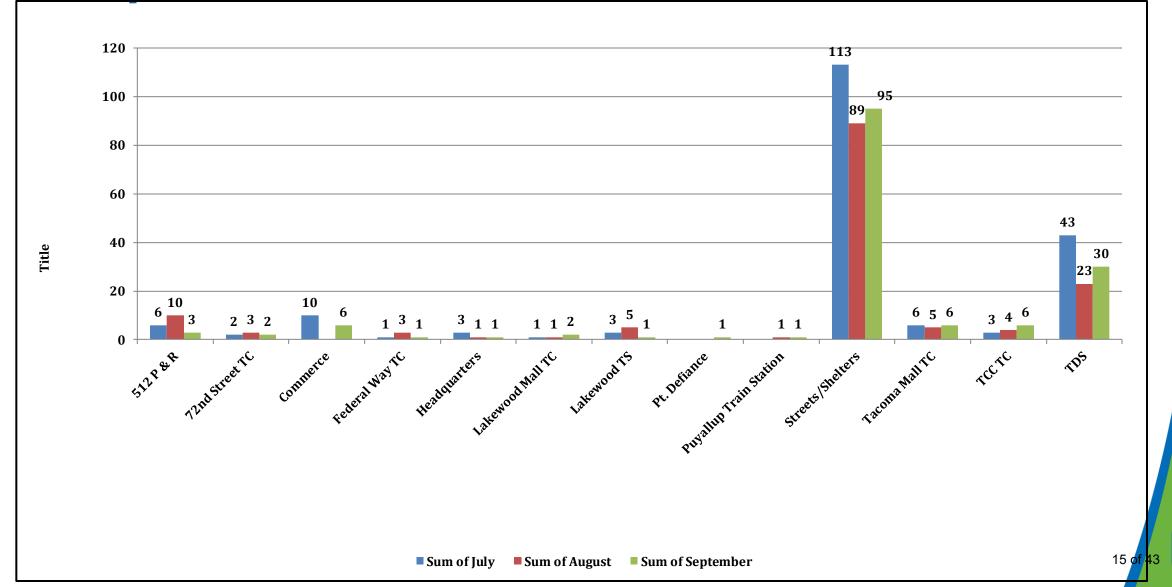
Key Take-Aways

- Total boardings for all modes are higher in July, August, and September (Projected) 2022 compared to same months in 2020 and 2021
- Boardings per service hour (all day types) are highest on PT routes 1, 2, 500, 202, and 28 and the lowest on 100, 497, 13, 63, and 425
- Average OTP for all PT routes during July, August, and September 2022 is 82.33%.
- Missed trips on PT routes in Q2 were the highest in August (518), then decreased in September (191)

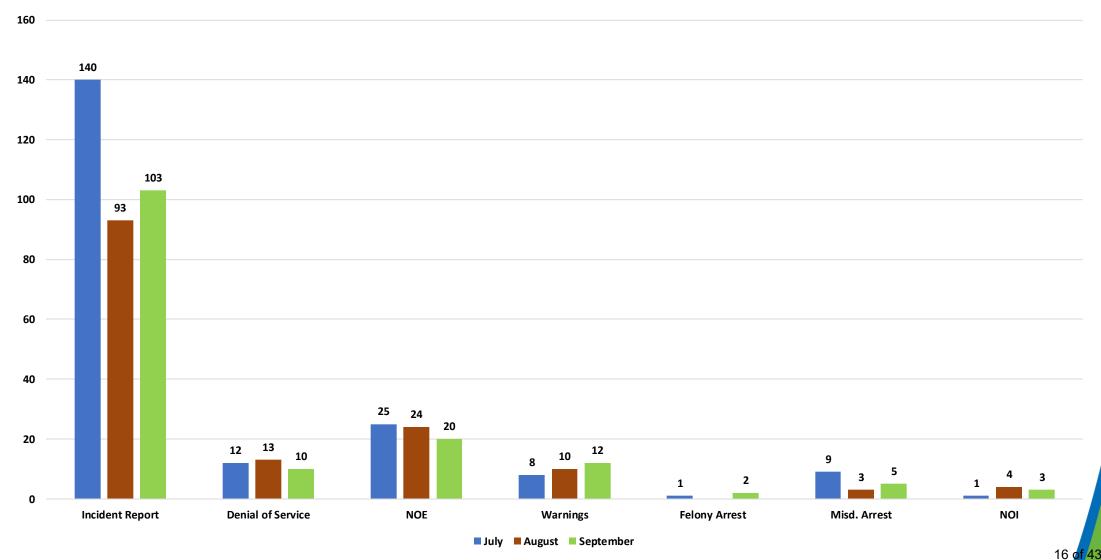

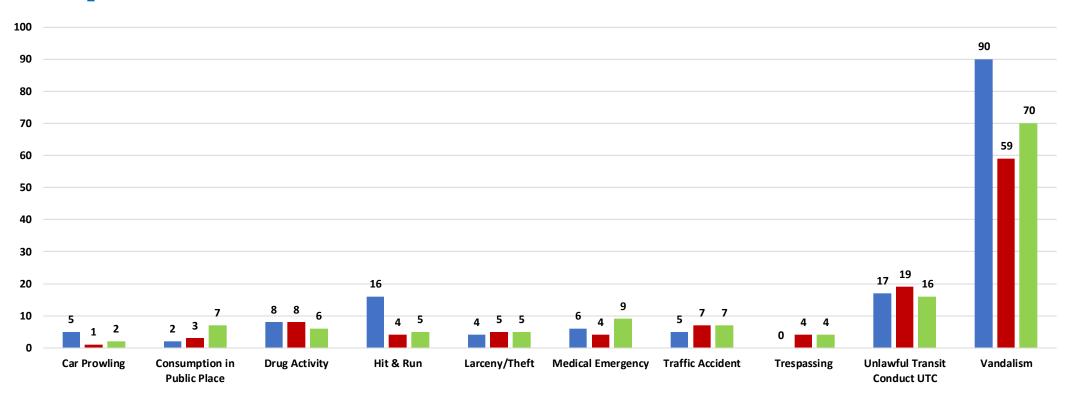
Top 10 Incident Locations



Resulting Actions for Reported Incidents



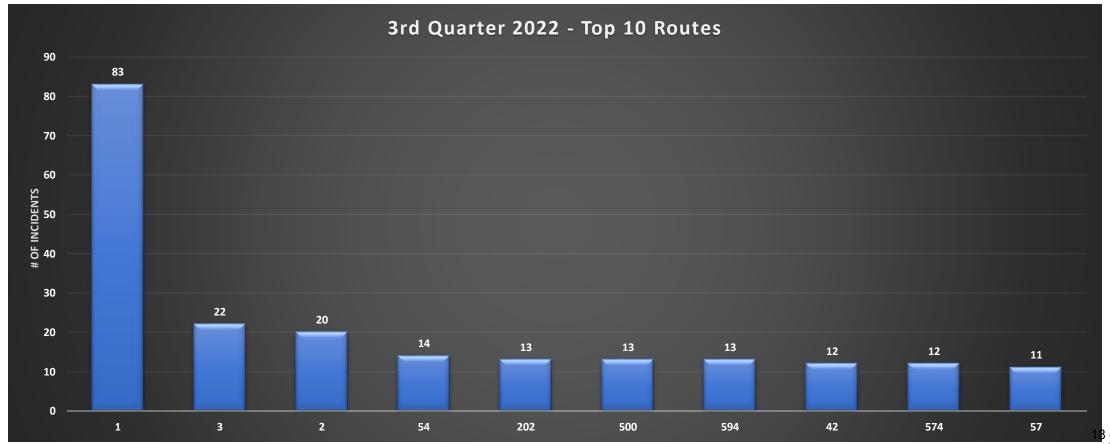
Top 10 Documented Offenses



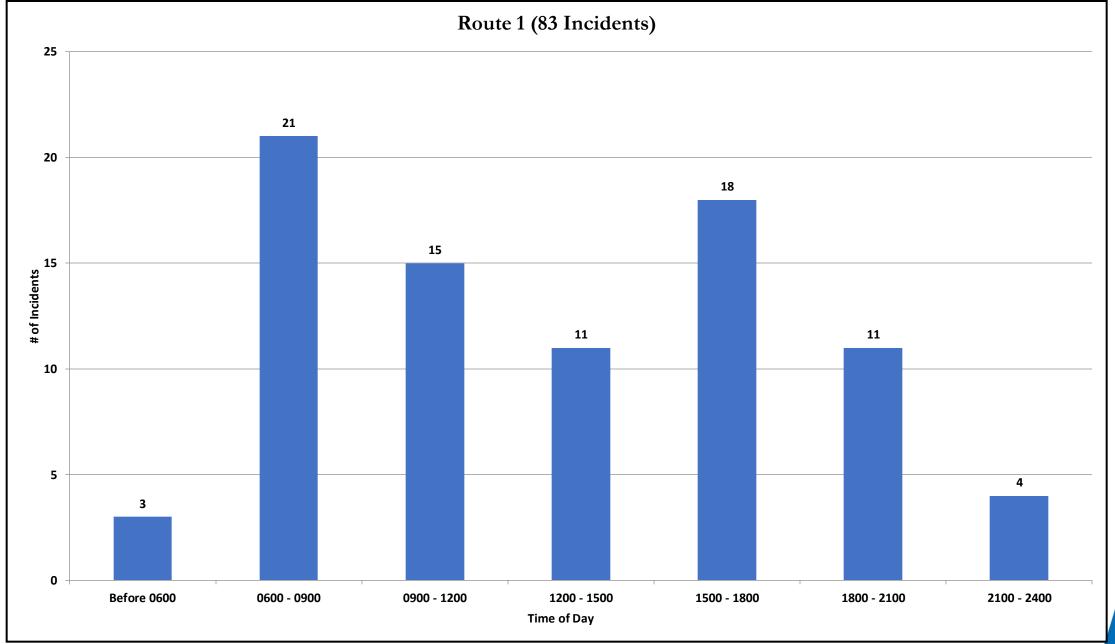

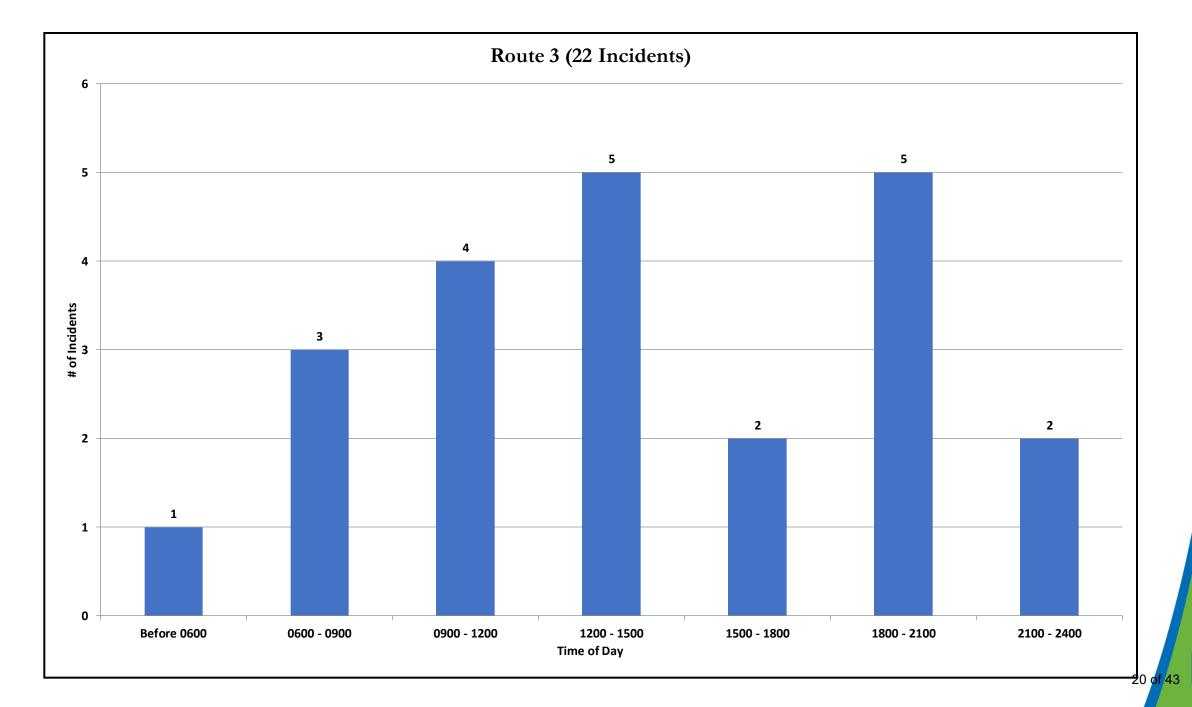

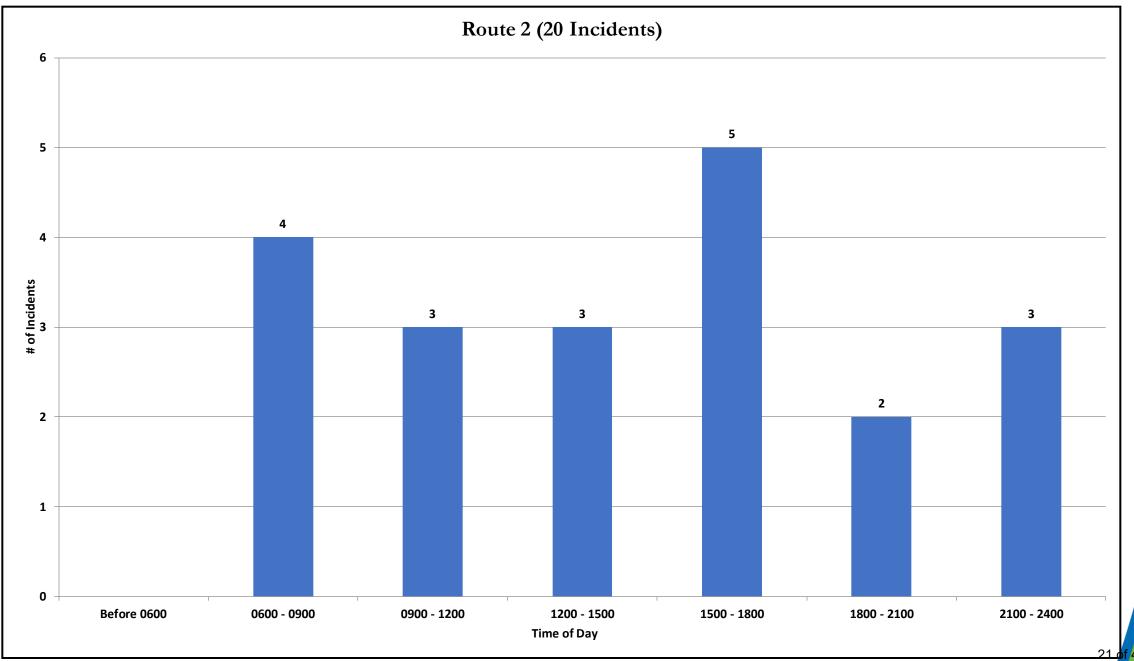

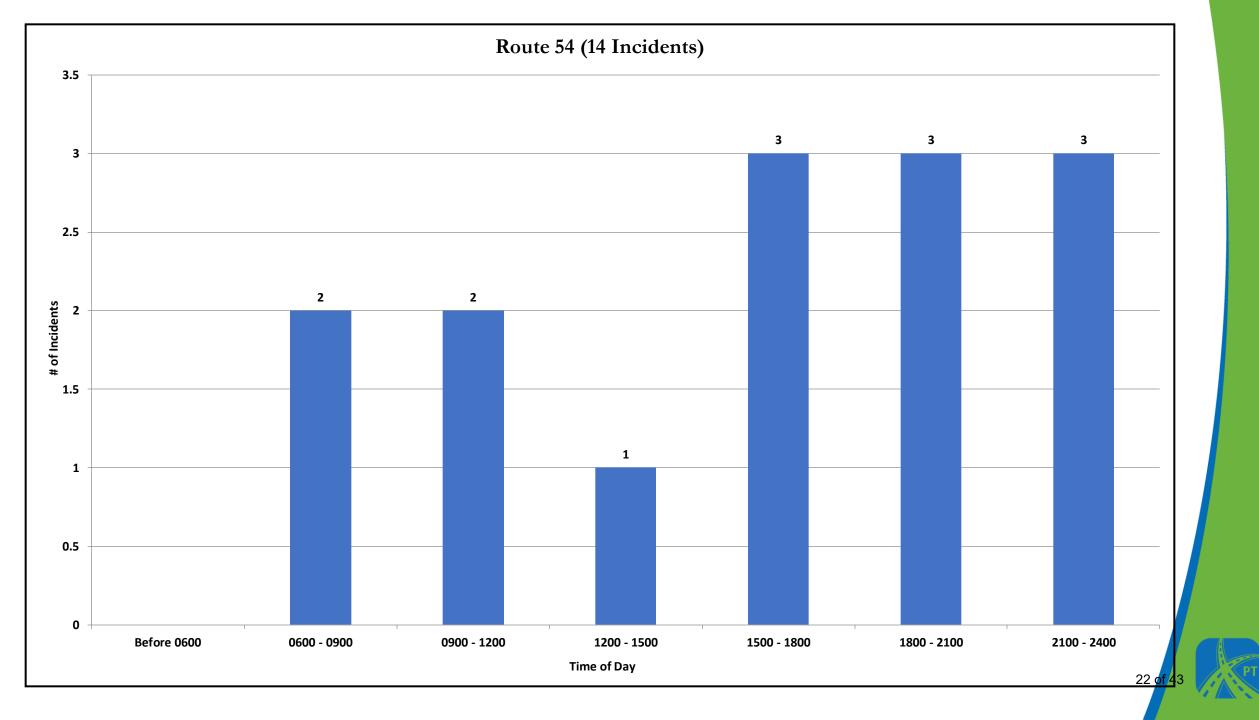


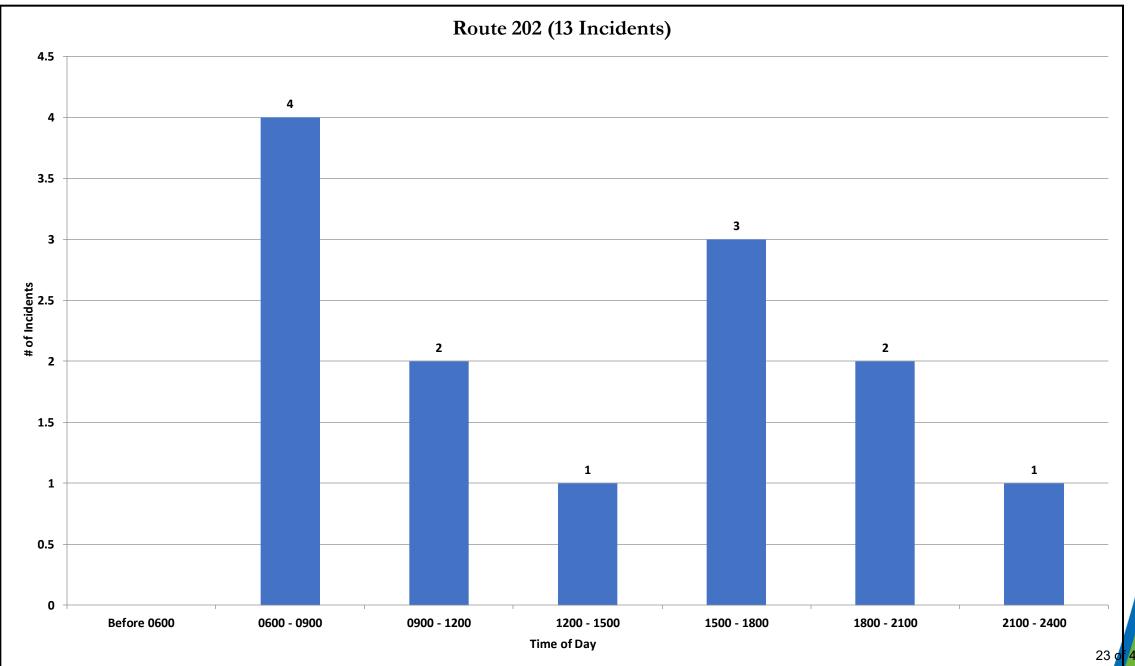


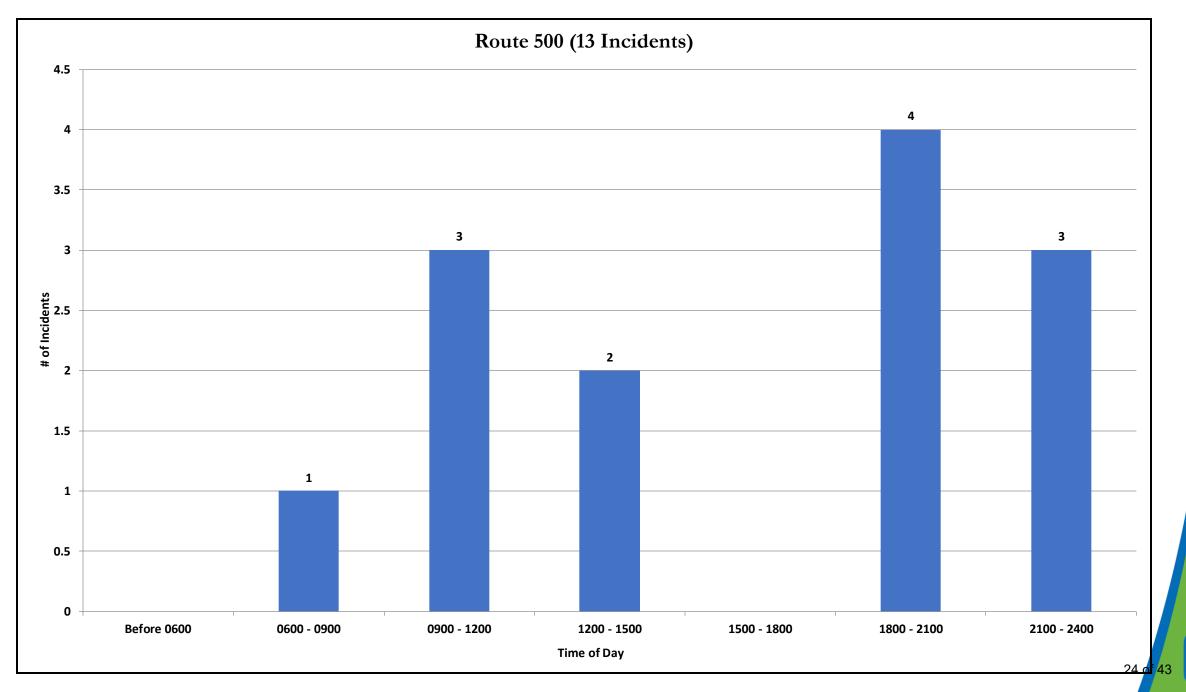


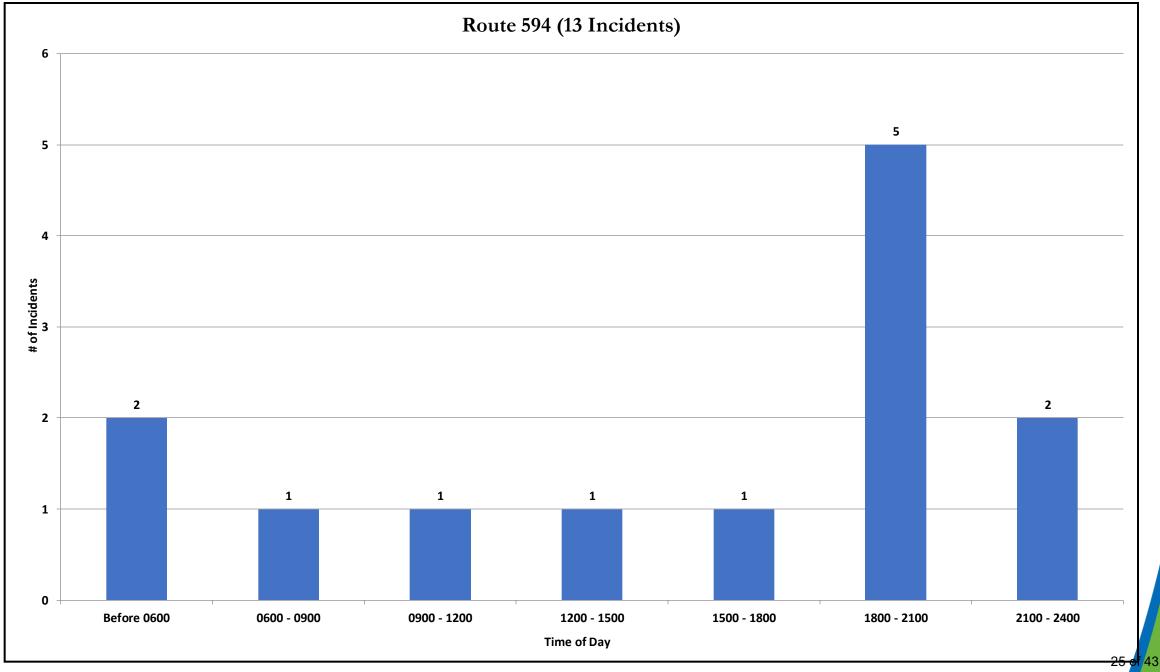


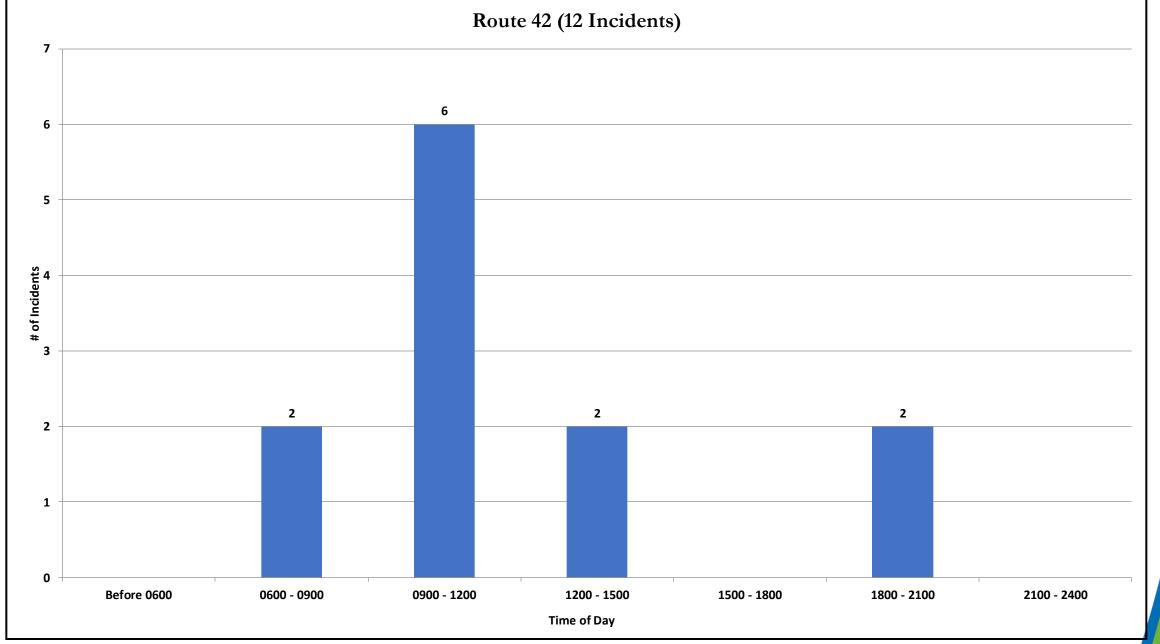


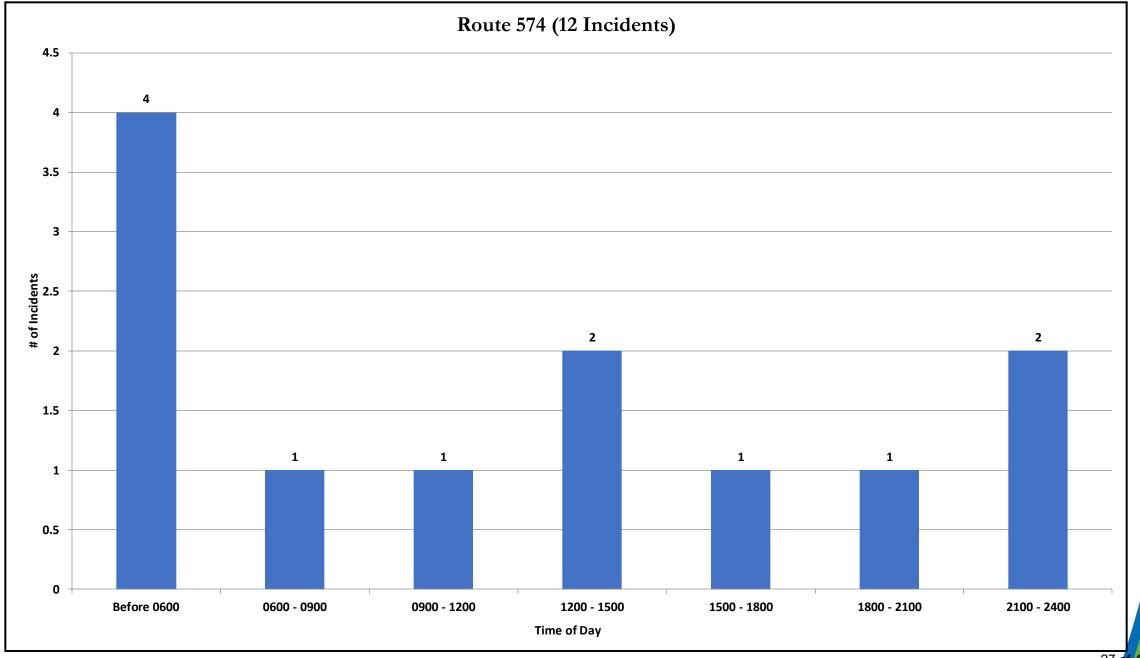


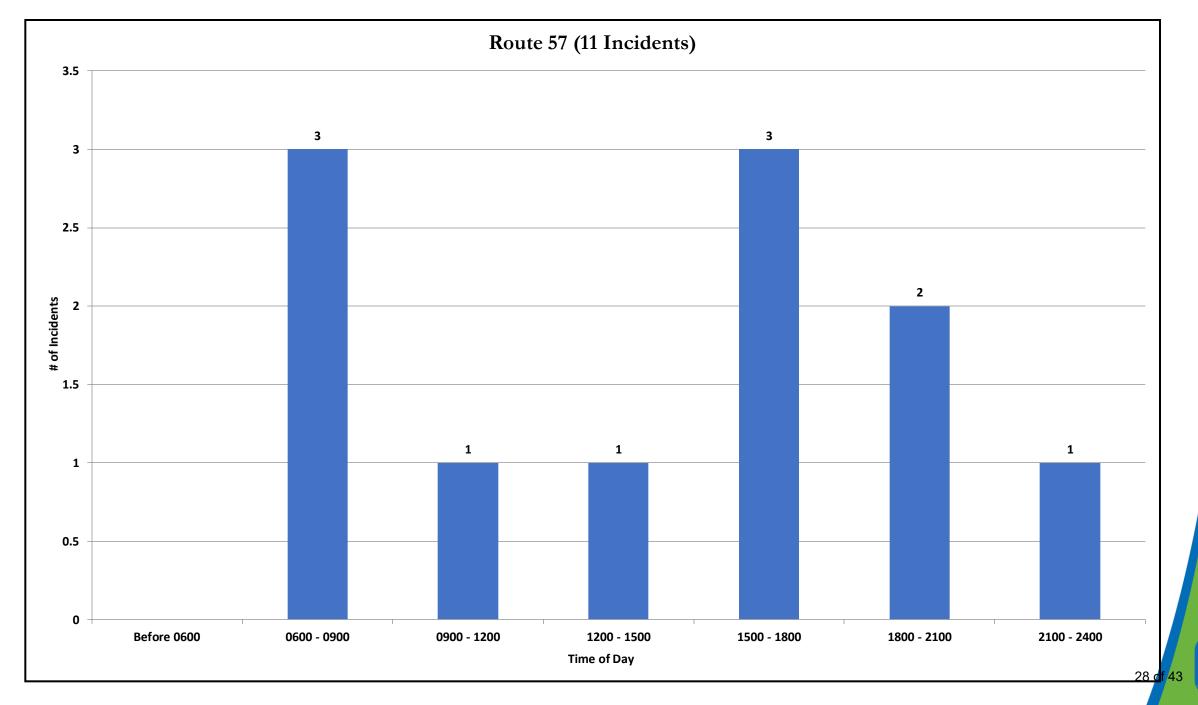




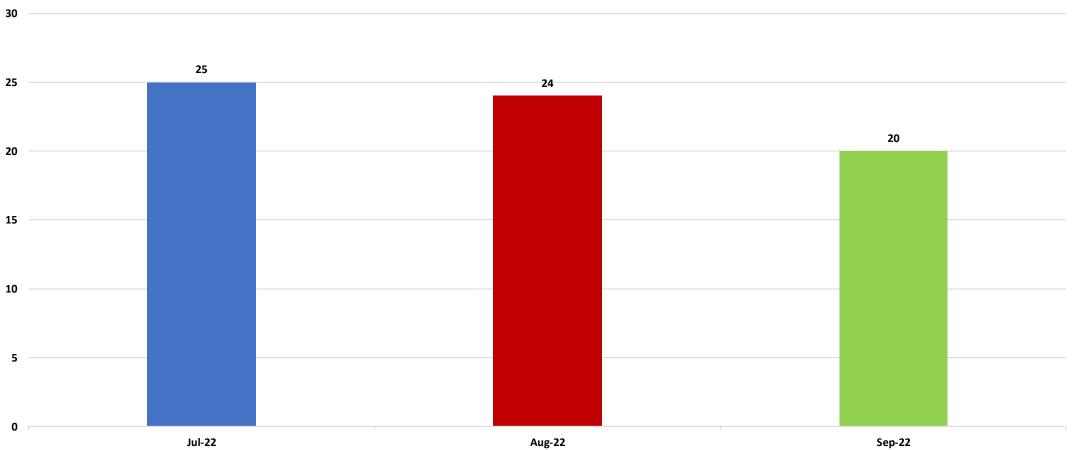






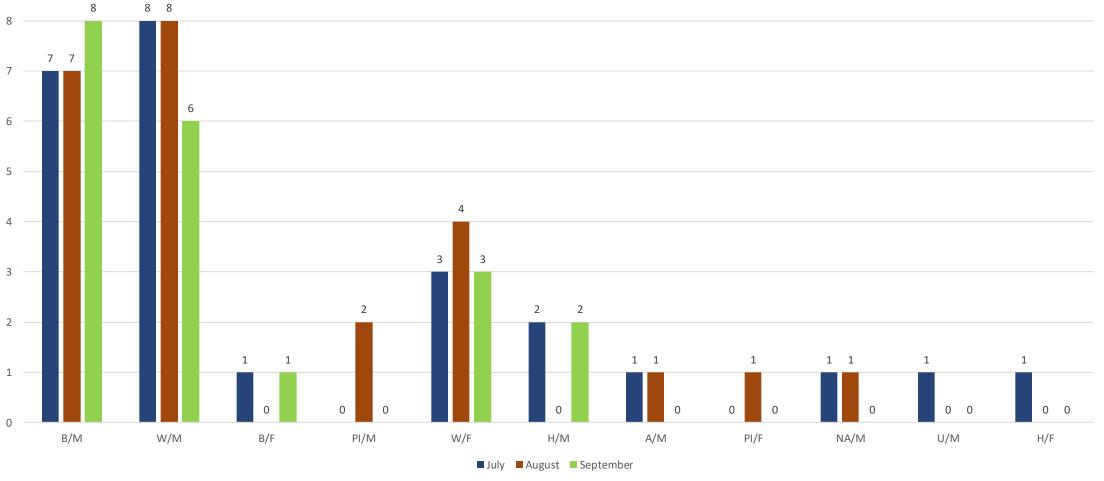


Notices of Exclusion Issued



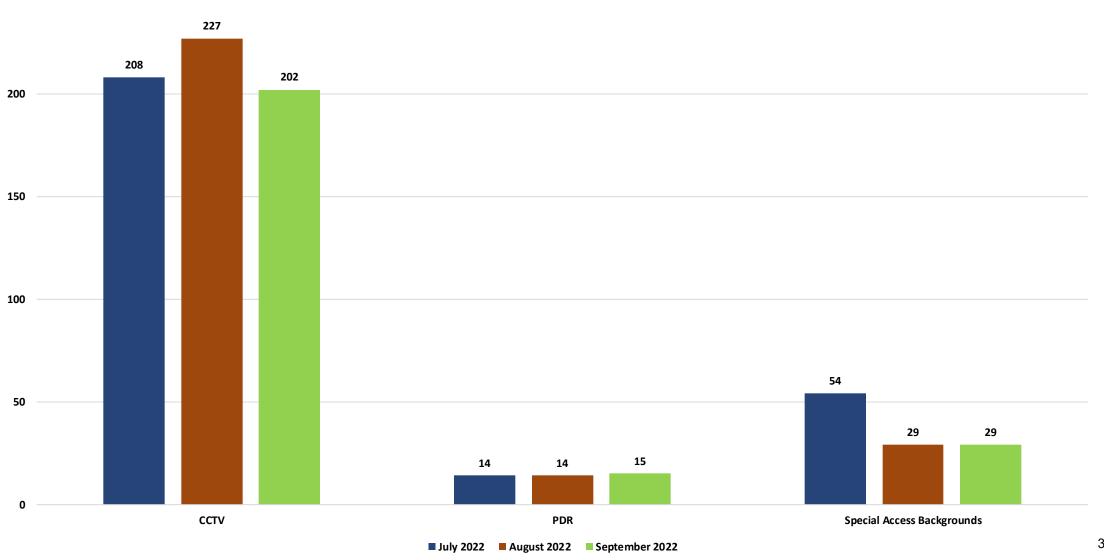

This chart reflects the total number of exclusions issued in the third quarter of 2022. It's been broken down by race and gender.

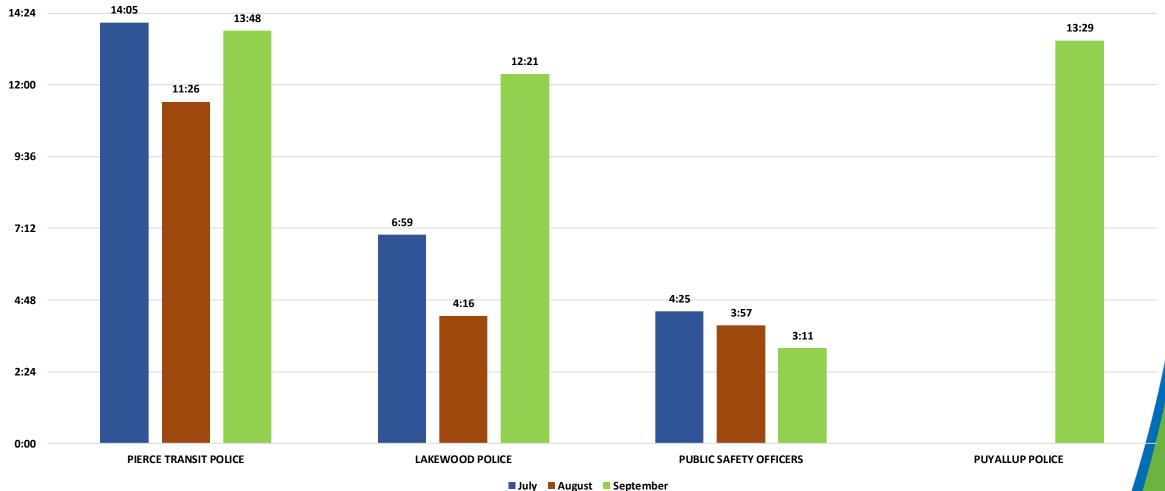

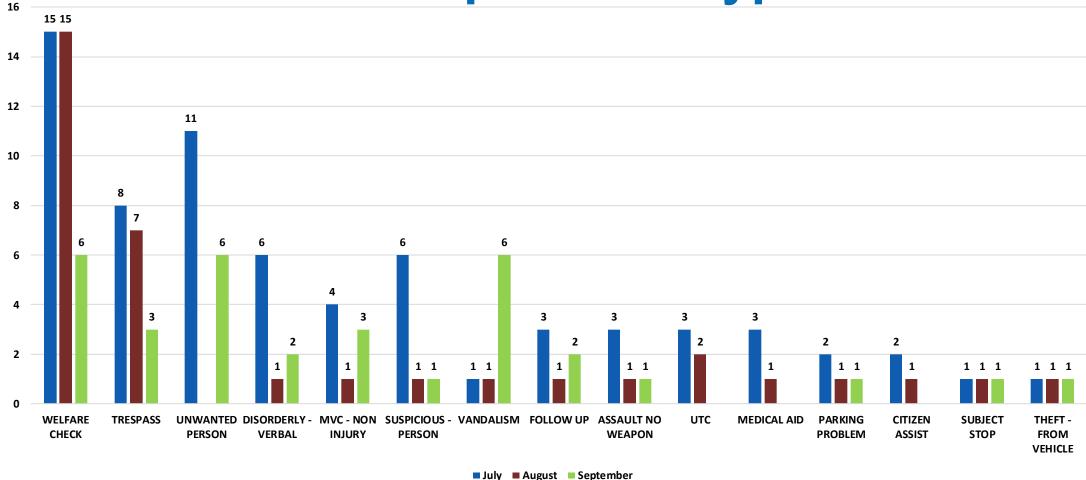

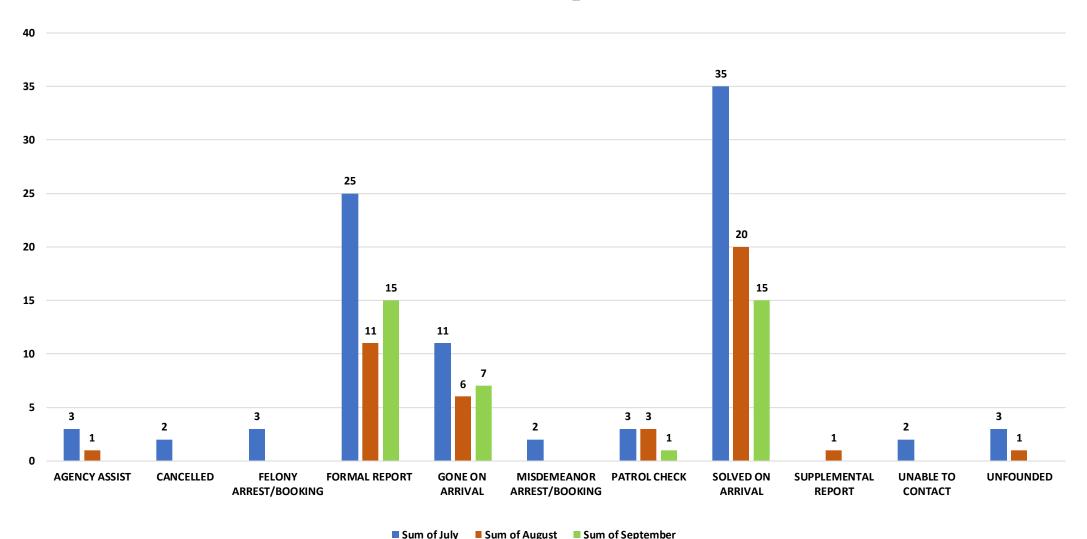


Transit Police Top 15 Call Types

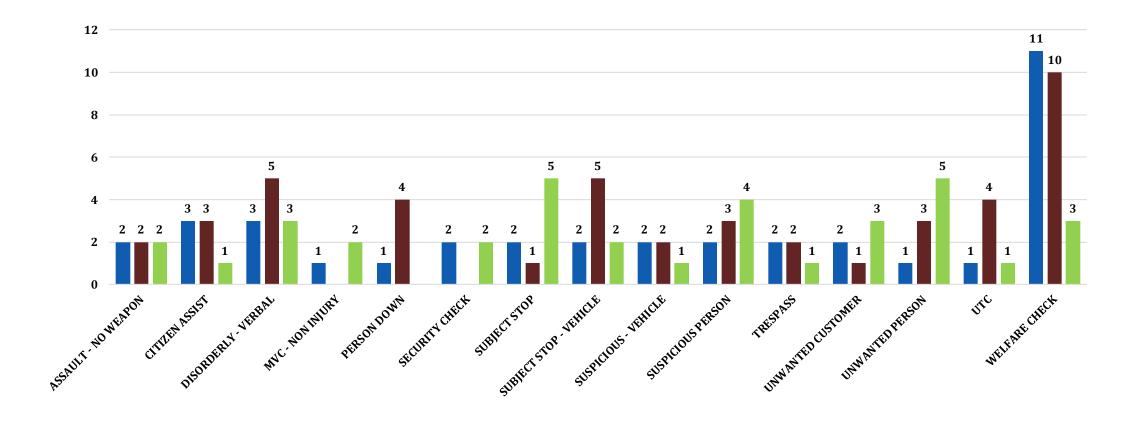

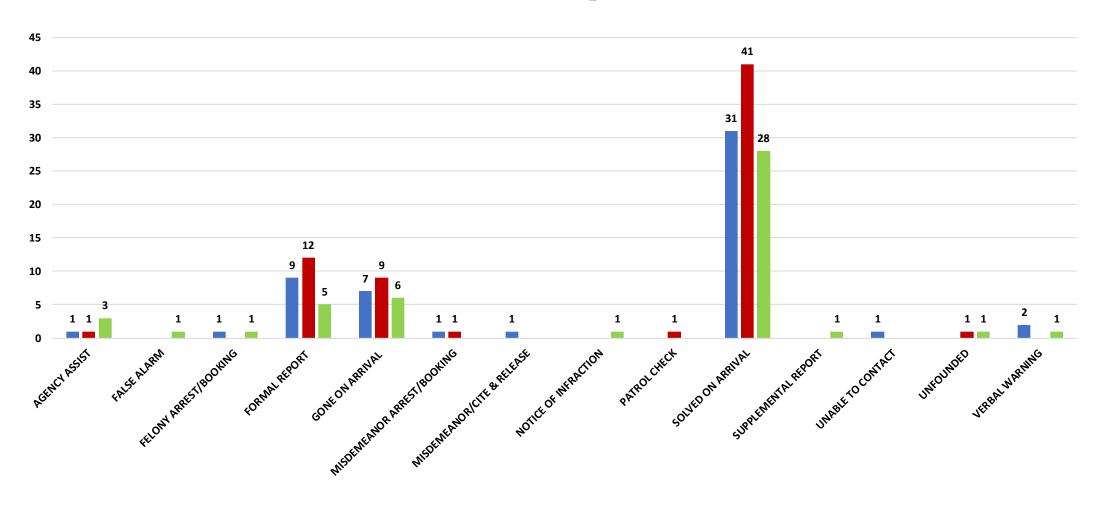
Transit Police Call Dispositions



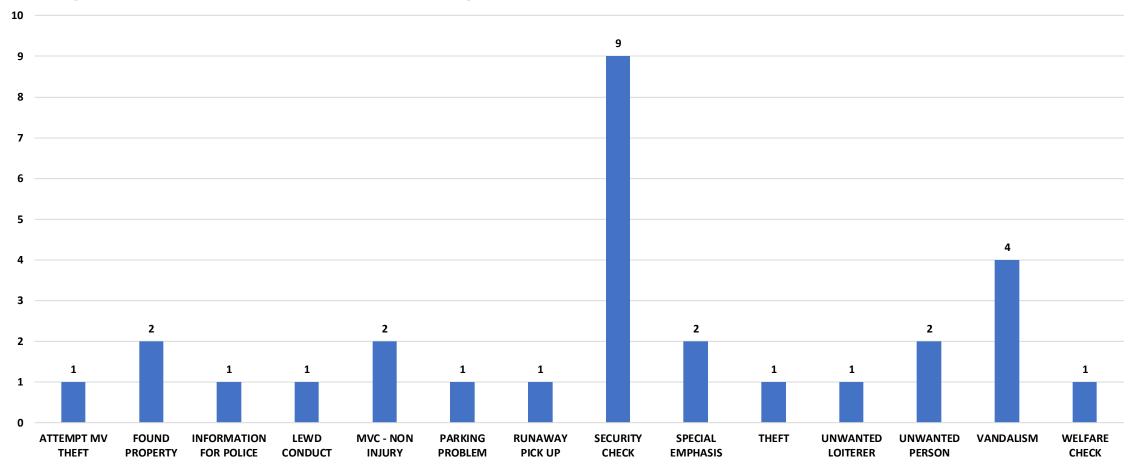
Lakewood PD Call Types

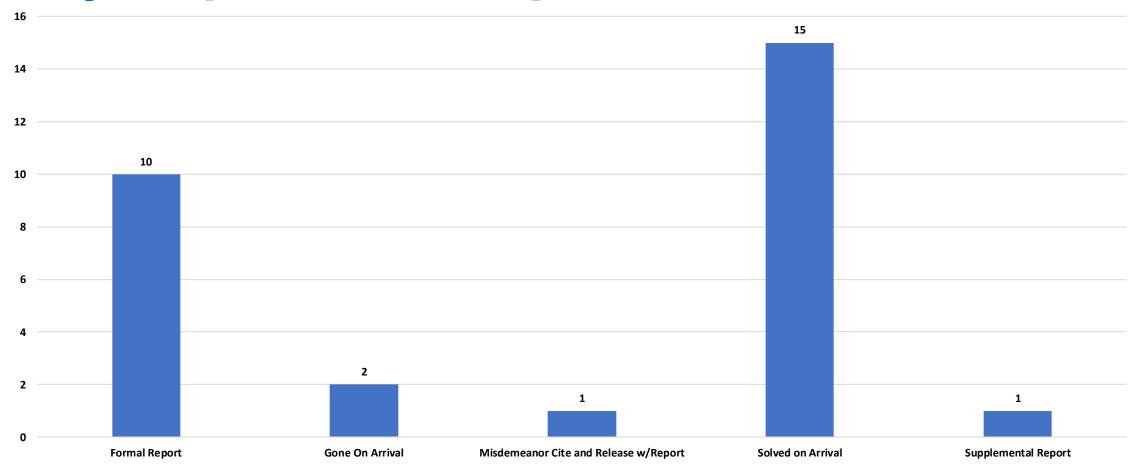


Puyallup PD Call Types



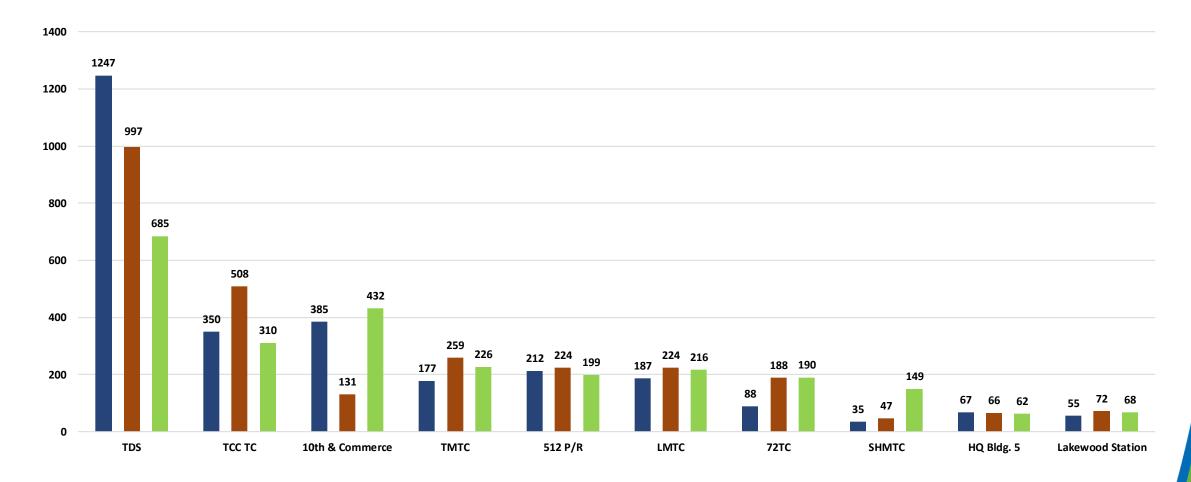

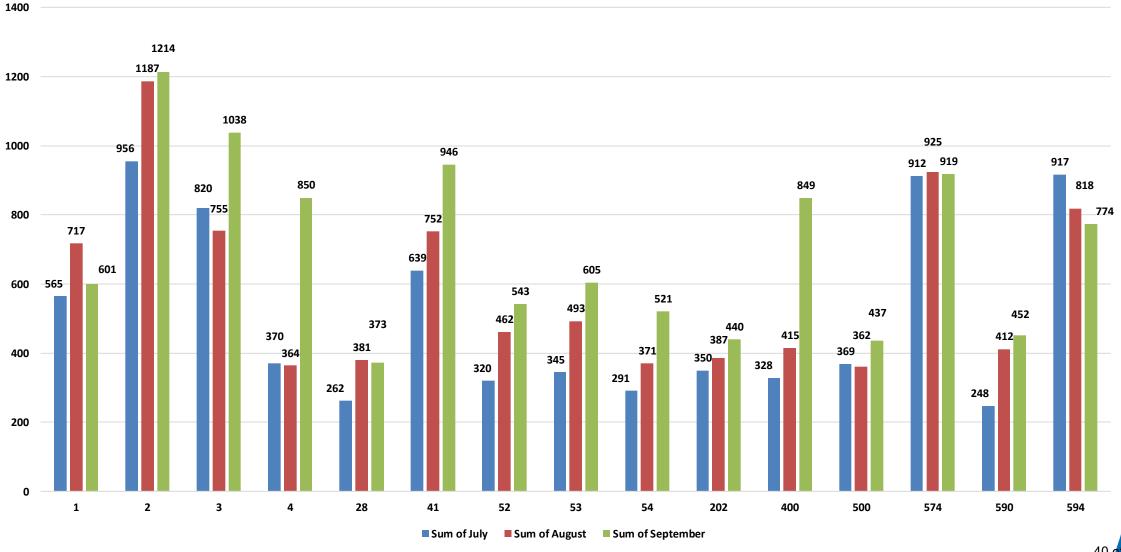

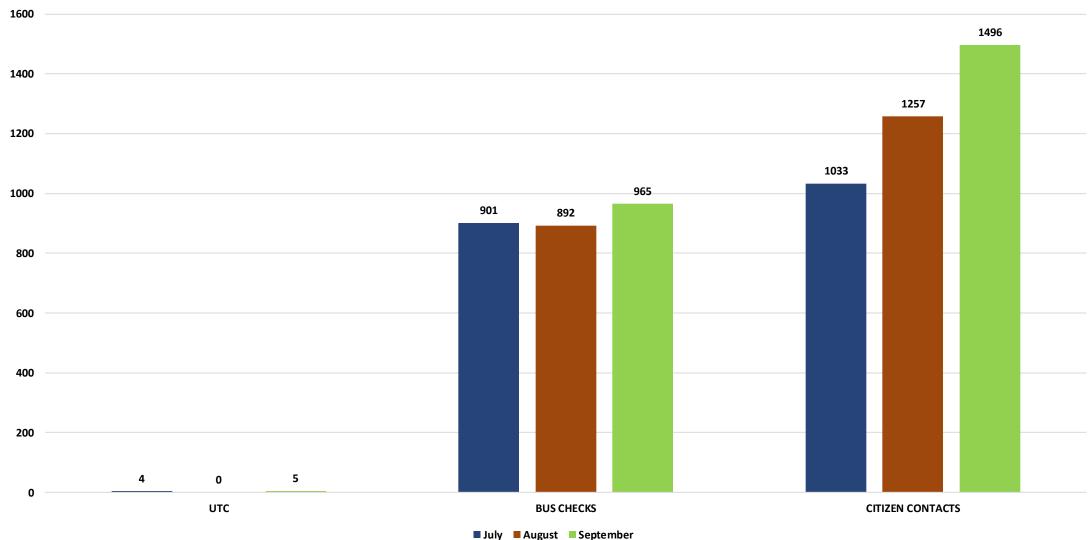
Facility Checks – Top Facilities



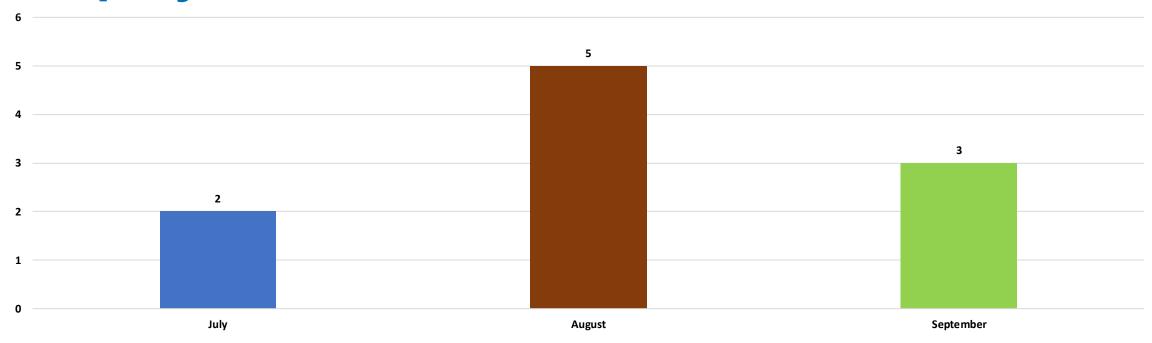
Bus Checks – Top Routes

Employee Assaults - 10



In the third quarter, there were 10 employee assaults:

- 2 involved the Employee being spit on or at.
- 5 involved a passenger making some sort of contact with the Employee (Push/Shove/Punch).
- 3 involved items being thrown at the Employee

10 Incidents: 4 resulted in arrest, 2 cases referred for charges with no arrest, and in 4 cases the suspect was not identified.

In the first quarter there were 6 Employee Assaults, in the second quarter there were 9 Employee Assaults.

In 2022 there have been 25 Employee Assaults. 14 of the 25 have been Operator assaults, 46% of the Operators assaults came from a fare dispute.
